A Bill for a Joint Resolution recommending to the electors of the state to vote at the next election of members of the Legislature for or against a convention to revise, amend and change the Constitution of the Sate of Nebraska in accordance with Section 2, Article 15. of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEBRASKA;
