Narrow Escape From Death.
Julius Polenz was terribly injured and had an almost miraculous escape from instant death Wednesday afternoon. He was working at the bottom of a 70 ft. well, and had just filled an iron bucket with wet sand and clay. He had given the signal to hoist and the bucket had been raised to a height of about forty feet when the rope broke. The heavy iron bucket loaded with perhaps one hundred pounds of earth plunged downward. Luckily Mr. Polenz was stooped over with his head to one side of the well, which probably saved him from instant death. As it was the bucket struck him a glancing blow on the shoulder and the full force of the falling bucket struck him midway between the hip and knee of his left leg, breaking both bones like pipe stems, the shattered ends of the bones being forced through the flesh and protruding as much as three inches. The injury is a very bad one but the wonder is that Mr. Polenz was not killed instantly. The serious nature of his injuries will lay him up probably for months, but there is but little doubt that he will eventually recover.—The Ravenna News.
