Municipal Ownership in Glasgow.

The city of Glasgow, Scotland, owns a public library of 160,000 volumes and is erecting a number of district libraries; conducts seven model lodging houses, one for women, which shelter 2,430 persons every night and pay 5 per cent profit; owns twenty-seven blocks of buildings, containing 200 shops and 1,362 buildings, which shelter 9,000 people; public banks, including Kosher banks for Jews, and also wash houses, in which hot water is furnished at a trifling price for family laundry work; gas and electric light and power works in which 3,000 men are employed; the street railway system, which employs 3,500 men and carries over 170,000,000 people annually. Furthermore it owns nine public markets, including one for old clothes, a telephone system that pays 15 per cent on the invested public capital; a labor bureau and a home for inebriates.
