In our report over the Haddix-Butler killing last Sunday we have carefully refrained from giving rumors, and various unauthentic reports from either side that might prejudice our readers. It is well that newspapers be extremely guarded in this respect previous to a hearing in the courts.

Editor J. R. Sutherland of the Tekamah Herald is engaged in lampooning Judge Willie G. Sears, ex-speaker of the legislature, for alleged badness, and doing an artistic job of it. Willie is poor people take exception to the honesty of others until he puts back money he took from the state which is declared unconstitutional.

The last righteous act of Speaker Rouse at the close of the session, was to turn back into the state treasury the \$60 he had received unconstitutionally as salary for presiding over that august body. A BLOODY TRAGEDY

Melvin Butler, a Sherman County Farmer, Killed by Scott Haddix, a Neighbor, Just Over the Line in Custer.

A tragedy was enacted just over the line in Custer county early last Sunday evening, about six miles north of Litchfield, when Scott Haddix, shot and killed a neighbor, Melvin Butler, a neighboring farmer living in Elm township, just inside the Sherman county line. The circumstances that led to the tragedy and developed at the inquest over the body of Butler, as given at the inquest by Butler's daughter, aged 14 years, and the hired man, Fuller, aged 19 years, and reported to us by one who was present and heard the testimony, was as follows: A little daughter of Mr. Butler had been visiting at the home of a neighbor named Joe Gill, living west of Haddix's place, and on the evening in question Butler sent two other of his children after her. When the children arrived at the Haddix farm, over which the road led, Haddix refused to let them pass and they returned home. At this Butler and his hired man, named Fuller, each bestrode a horse and sallied forth over the disputed way to Gill's farm over the child. When they reached the Haddix farm the latter refused the right of way, claiming it no public road, to which Butler claimed the opposite, but ending in Butler and his man passing through Haddix going into his house, securing a gun and sending a shot after the two men. On their return later, with Butler on foot and the child and hired man on horseback they sought to again cross the Haddix farm, when just as Butler began opening the entrance to the farm Haddix appeared and ordered him to desist. A heated discussion ensued, followed by a shot from Haddix which did no harm. Butler then drew a revolver and fired at Haddix without result, snapped his revolver twice again without it going off, and then again the fourth time, this time sending a bullet at Haddix a second time without harm. Following this, Haddix again fired his shotgun the shot striking Butler in the left side and breast, causing almost instant death.

We take another version of the affair from a Broken Bow special to the Lincoln and Omaha dailies, as follows: **BROKEN BOW, Neb., April 17.**—Scott Haddix, a well known farmer living eight miles north of Mason, shot and killed Melvin Butler, another farmer, on the former's property early last evening. The trouble, which has been breeding for some time, was over a roadway running through Haddix's property. Both parties met Sunday night on the disputed ground and Haddix ordered Butler off. Butler replied that it was a regularly laid out road and he had a right there, Butler firing first; so Haddix alleges, the latter returned the fire from behind a post, where he jumped, killing his antagonist. Haddix came here on the midnight train and stayed at the Globe hotel all night. While eating breakfast this morning he was arrested by Sheriff Richardson and taken into custody. Arrangements for a preliminary hearing will be made as quickly as possible. Judge Sullivan will appear for the defendant. Haddix has always borne a good reputation.
We understand Judge Wall has also been retained for the defense.

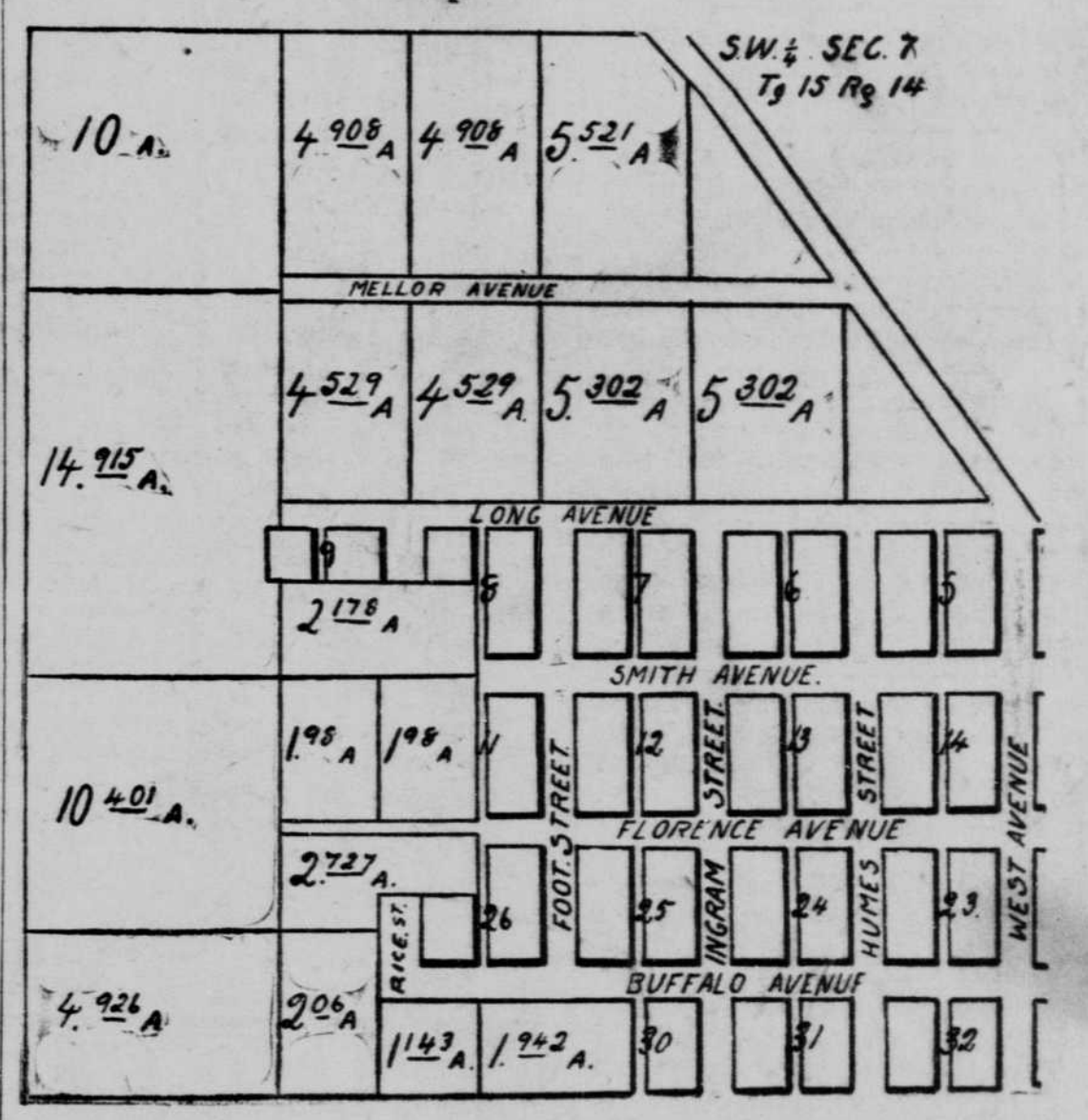
