About every so often, Dr. Wm. B. Ely of University Place inflicts the readers of the State Journal with a long winded screed on some abstract proposition, or mayhaps upon some subject that is running the gauntlet of public criticism. Whatever the subject matter, this inveterate boor is always on hand with his "piece." When the Journal has received as much of chastisement along the line of his proffered writings as has the writer of this, they will appreciate what we say in regard to the venerable ass. It is said the good die young. The doctor is getting well along in years.

The following formula is given for fumigating school building with formaldehyde: Use five ounces of formaldehyde for every 1,000 cubic feet of space. Use the formaldehyde on a large piece of cloth like sheets strung across the room, one sheet for every five ounces or 1,000 feet; shut doors and windows and leave for 24 hours. It can be followed on any Saturday. It is a good plan to fumigate all school buildings occasionally. Another plan of fumigating is to place one part of formaldehyde to ten of water and place on the stove. This can be used while school is in session. If it becomes too strong, weaken with water.

Governor Mickey announced Monday that Attorney General Brown, with his sanction, would some time this week institute suit in the supreme court to test the constitutionality of the biennial election law passed by the recent legislature. He stated that a candidate for regent would offer a certificate of nomination for filing in the office of Secretary of State Galusha, when suit will be brought for a mandamus compelling that official to receive the certificate. This will bring the case before the supreme court without delay and make it possible to secure a decision before the close of the January term, thereby getting around the diplomacy of the framers of the bill which led them to omit the emergency clause in the hope of delaying action until it would be too late to make provisions for the election this fall, and thereby force the supreme court, as a measure of expediency, to give its approval to the law.

And now it is given out that Tommy Tibbles, De France, Edmundson and other of the high priests of the populist faith will soon inflict upon the people of Nebraska a straight-out populist organ. It was only a week or so ago that Tibbles' organ, the Independent, was sold to the late fusion candidate for governor, Berge, who changed it into a strident democratic sheet, and we were informed Tommy was going to be the head of a banking firm in New York City. But now the scene shifts and we are informed that the redoubtable Thom will set up on being a bank president and give Nebraska populists a red-hot and still sizzling pop sheet whose lurid glow will dazzle the eyes of its satellites and make the Berge effusion look like the gleam of a tallow candle by the side of a lime light that will diffuse the columns of the new wild-eyed proposition. Let there be no delusion. The people will be in pent up agony and suspense till the real thing comes.

In several Nebraska cities and towns the first effective fight ever inaugurated against the mail order houses of Chicago is now in progress. Instead of scolding the big firms and demanding the abolition of the rural mail delivery and asking for restrictive legislation, a few local merchants are buying liberal spaces in their home papers for the purpose of showing the farmers and town people that goods can be purchased at home more cheaply and satisfactorily than in Chicago. The campaign is conducted along definite and convincing lines. The Chicago prices are quoted, with freight or express charges added. Then the merchant tells what he can do on the same goods, with the privilege of examination before they are taken from the store. If all the country merchants would adopt this enlightened and effective policy they could reduce the Chicago mail order shipments into Nebraska by fifty per cent in less than five years.—State Journal.

## Change in the Game Laws.

State Game Warden Cart r has compiled the following summary of the revised game laws of the state of Nebraska. Sportsmen will do well to look them over as a considerable number of changes were made this winter by the legislature:  
Prairie chicken, sage chicken and grouse—September 1 to November 30.  
Quail—November 16 to November 30 inclusive.  
Wild duck, geese, brant, swan crane and game water fowl—September 1 to April 15.  
Jack snipe, Wilson snipe and yellow legs—September 1 to May 15.  
Will 1 pigeons, doves and plover—July 1 to July 31.

Not more than ten wild geese or brant and twenty-five game birds of other varieties to be killed in one day, and no person allowed to have in his possession more than ten wild geese or brant, fifty ducks and fifty other birds at one time. Provided that not more than ten prairie chickens may be had in possession during the month of September.  
Trout (not less than eight inches in length)—April 1 to October 1.  
All other fish—April 1 to November 15.

Not more than twenty-five fish to be caught in one day, and not more than fifty to be in possession of one person at one time.  
No game or fish to be had in possession more than five days after the close of the season.  
No hunting allowed in the night.  
Only ordinary shoulder guns to be used.  
No fishing allowed except with rod and line and not more than five hooks on one line.  
Hunters must hold license—\$10 for non-residents, \$5 for residents.  
Non-residents not allowed to take out of state more than fifty game birds or twenty-five fish. Game must be accompanied by owner on same train.  
Non-residents are permitted to fish in the state upon payment of a fee of \$2.

Trapping the Andean Condor.  
Anyone who has ever watched a heavy bird rise from the ground has doubtless noticed that it runs along the ground for a few feet before it rises; the bird must acquire some momentum before its wings can lift its heavy body into the air. The natives in certain parts of the Andes understand this fact very well and by means of it catch the great Andean vultures, the condors. A small space is shut in with a high fence and left open at the top. Then a lamb or a piece of carrion is placed on the ground inside. Presently a vulture sees the bait and swoops down upon it, but when once he finds he has alighted on the ground inside he cannot get out, for he has no running space in which to acquire the momentum that is necessary before his wings can lift him.

Statutes Oddly Worded.  
Years ago the British parliament passed a bill for the rebuilding of a jail at Chelmsford. It was agreed that the prisoners should be confined to the old jail while the new one was building. The new one, however, was to be constructed from the materials of the old one. In the reign of King William IV. a statute was passed fixing the punishment of fourteen years' transportation for a particular offense. It added: "Upon conviction, one-half thereof shall go to the king and one-half to the informer." Just why the king should be transported for half the term the person who drew the act found it impossible to explain, since he had merely made a ludicrous blunder.

Robert Watke, formerly a truck grain buyer at Farwell, was in town the first of the week. He informed all he met here that he had retired from business and intended to devote his entire time to prosecuting the Burlington Railroad company for alleged discriminations during the time he was located at Farwell and Ashton.—St. Paul Republican.


