Tramps Stretch Hemp.
A young fellow giving his name as Wm. Boatrider was slugged with a coupling pin or some other similar instrument of, knocked into insensibility and robbed of sixty-five dollars in cash, last Wednesday afternoon.

Boatrider had been working for some month's past in Billings and was on his way home, near Des Moines, Ia., and in order to save railroad fare was "hobbing" it on a freight to this point where he decided to buy a ticket for the rest of the journey. While inquiring about rates, etc., he was approached by a fairly well dressed stranger who took him off to one side and advised him not to buy a ticket, and told him that he was a freight brakeman and that if he would give him a dollar he would stow him away in a car, which he did, where Boatrider fell asleep, and was awakened by two fellows opening the side door breaking the seal to get in. They came back to where Boatrider was lying and one of them dealt him a stunning blow with his fist, striking him just above the left eye. Then one grabbed him by the throat and strangled him while the other man searched his pockets and took all his money, about \$65, as he claims.

After they had robbed him, one of the men said, "we had better hit the— again, so he won't holler" and suiting the action to the words he dealt Boatrider a blow on the head with a piece of iron which weighed eight pounds.
Boatrider laid unconscious for an hour or more, but he finally came to his senses and climbed out of the car and gave the alarm. His face was bloody and badly bruised, and blood was streaming from a scalp wound where he had been hit with the iron bludgeon.

Search immediately commenced for the robbers. Freight train 45, which had pulled out shortly after the robbery was stopped at a point up the road and searched, but the men wanted were not found. Finally Marshal Cuddy with a posse of railroad men, and young Boatrider, got on a hand car and went to Nantasket U. P. crossing where four men were found hiding behind the semaphore house, lying flat on the ground hoping to escape notice, but their presence was discovered, and they were arrested. Three of the men were positively identified by Boatrider, one as the pretended brakeman, and two others as the ones who assaulted and robbed him.

They gave themselves up without trouble and they were searched but without results. They were placed in jail, which was well guarded, and Wednesday evening they were taken out one by one and every stitch of clothing on them searched, but without results. Three of them practically confessed to their part in the affair but would give no information concerning the money.

During all this time a large crowd had collected, awaiting developments. When the last man had been searched and nothing found, F. E. Brogden and Will Herbaugh, who were serving as deputies, started to take one of the men back to the jail, when they were set upon by the mob. Herbaugh attempted to defend the prisoner and he was knocked down for his pains. The prisoner was hustled to the bottom of the subway under the B. & M. tracks at the foot of Appian avenue, where a rope was placed around his

neck, the other end being in the hands of a dozen or more as husky and enthusiastic citizens as ever undertook a job of this sort. The culprit was then given an opportunity to confess and was told that if he did not he would be strung up. He confessed to a part in the assault and robbery but said he had got only \$1.80. The word was given and up he went and then let down. He came down still insisting that he got only \$1.80, when he was strung up again when he commenced to show signs of utter collapse. One of the other prisoners was served the same and the other two let loose, as the two who were strung up had done the work.—Ravenna News.

Articles of Incorporation.

Be it remembered that on this 8th day of April, 1905, that we, P. Jensen, Geo. W. Woten, J. A. Woten and N. Jensen, do form an incorporation under and by virtue of the laws of the State of Nebraska.

I. This Incorporation shall be known as the ROCKVILLE STATE BANK of Rockville, Nebraska.

II. The principal place of transacting business shall be at the town of Rockville, Sherman county, Nebraska.

III. This Incorporation shall commence business on the 1st day of June, 1905, and shall terminate on the 1st day of June, 1925, unless sooner dissolved by holders of a majority of the capital stock thereof.

IV. The general nature of the business to be transacted shall be that of buying and selling Foreign and Domestic exchange, receiving money and credits on deposits, loaning money on personal, collateral or other security, buying notes, warrants, and other securities and the transacting of all proper and legitimate commercial banking business.

V. The authorized capital of this bank shall be Ten Thousand Dollars, 50 per cent of which shall be paid in before commencing business and the balance to be paid in upon call of the Board of Directors.

VI. The highest indebtedness to which this Incorporation shall at any time subject itself shall not exceed a sum equal to two thirds of its paid up capital stock, not however including liability for deposits.

VII. The affairs of this Corporation shall be conducted by a Board of Directors, to consist of three members who shall have power to elect the officers of said corporation during the time for which they shall themselves be elected, to pass a suitable code of by-laws for the government of said officers and the affairs of the bank not in conflict with these articles of incorporation or the laws of the State. Such Board of Directors shall be elected annually at a meeting of the shareholders of said bank, to be held at the banking house of said corporation, in Rockville, Nebr., on the first Tuesday of each year and shall hold their office until their successors are elected. Until the first annual election, to be held in the year 1905, the following named share holders shall hold the office as Directors of this bank: P. JENSEN, GEO. W. WOTEN and J. A. WOTEN.

Legal Notice of the Incorporation of the Sherman County Telephone Company.

STATE OF NEBRASKA, SHERMAN COUNTY.

Notice is hereby given that the Sherman County Telephone Company has adopted articles of incorporation and filed them in the office of the County Clerk of Sherman County and of the Secretary of State of the State of Nebraska for the purpose of becoming incorporated under the laws of Nebraska, and that said articles of incorporation provide as follows:

1. The name of said corporation shall be the Sherman County Telephone Company.

2. The principal place of transacting its business is at Loup City in Sherman County, Nebraska.

3. The nature of the business to be transacted by said corporation shall be the constructing, buying, holding, renting and operating a public telephone system or systems in the cities, towns, villages and country districts of Sherman County and other counties in the State of Nebraska, with power to sell any portion or portions of such system or systems. Also to buy, sell and lease such real estate as may be necessary or convenient for the transaction of said business. Said corporation shall have authority to enter into contracts with other telephone companies or persons for the common use of telephone property and to acquire and hold all such rights and franchises as may be beneficial or necessary to said business.

4. The amount of capital stock authorized is limited to fifty thousand dollars, divided into shares of one hundred dollars each of which twenty-five per cent shall be subscribed and paid for before the commencement of business, and the remainder of said capital stock to be paid at the call of the Board of Directors.

5. Said corporation shall commence to exist on the 11th day of May, 1905, and shall terminate its existence on the 11th day of May, 1935.

6. The highest amount of indebtedness or liability to which said corporation shall at any one time be subject, shall not exceed two-thirds of the paid in capital stock.

7. The affairs of said corporation shall be conducted by a Board of Directors, consisting of five members, from whom shall be elected a President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer and General Manager. All of said officers shall be elected by the stockholders at their annual meeting, which shall be held on the second Thursday in May in each year.

Articles of Incorporation.

KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS: That we, Elmer E. Boynton, of Spearman, Illinois, E. G. Barnum, H. A. Olerich and Jonas I. Parshall, of Butte, Nebraska, do hereby associate ourselves together for the purpose of forming and becoming a corporation under and by virtue of the laws of the State of Nebraska, and do adopt the following Articles of Incorporation:

ARTICLE I.
The name of said corporation shall be LOUP CITY MILL & LIGHT COMPANY.

ARTICLE II.
The principal place of transacting business shall be at Loup City, in the County of Sherman and State of Nebraska. Provided that the Board of Directors may hold meetings for the transaction of business at other places in the State of Nebraska, when notified by the President or Secretary five days prior to such meeting, of the time and place thereof.

ARTICLE III.
The general nature of the business to be transacted and conducted by said corporation shall be the owning, maintaining and operating a mill, for the making and selling of flour, meal, feed and other mill-stuffs, and doing a general exchange and merchant milling business; to acquire a franchise, and erect, equip, maintain, own and operate an electric lighting plant in Loup City, Nebr., or at other towns or cities in Sherman County, Nebraska; to sell or lease electric power for other purposes than electric lights, and generally to promote by any lawful means the manufacture and sale of flour, feed, and other mill-stuffs, and the erection, maintenance and operation of an electric power plant, and in the course of said business to purchase and hold real estate, to acquire franchises for lighting and power purposes, and to make contracts in the general course of the milling, lighting and power business.

ARTICLE IV.
The authorized capital stock of said corporation shall be Twenty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000), divided into shares of One Hundred Dollars (\$100) each, which shares, when paid up shall be non-assessable. Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000) of said capital stock shall be held in the Treasury of said corporation, subject to the disposal of the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE V.
Said corporation shall begin to exist on April 15th, A. D. 1905, and its existence shall terminate April 15th, 1925.

ARTICLE VI.
The highest amount of indebtedness or liability to which said corporation shall at any time subject itself, shall be two-thirds of the capital stock.

ARTICLE VII.
The affairs of said corporation shall be conducted by a Board of Directors, consisting of three members, who shall be stockholders in said corporation.

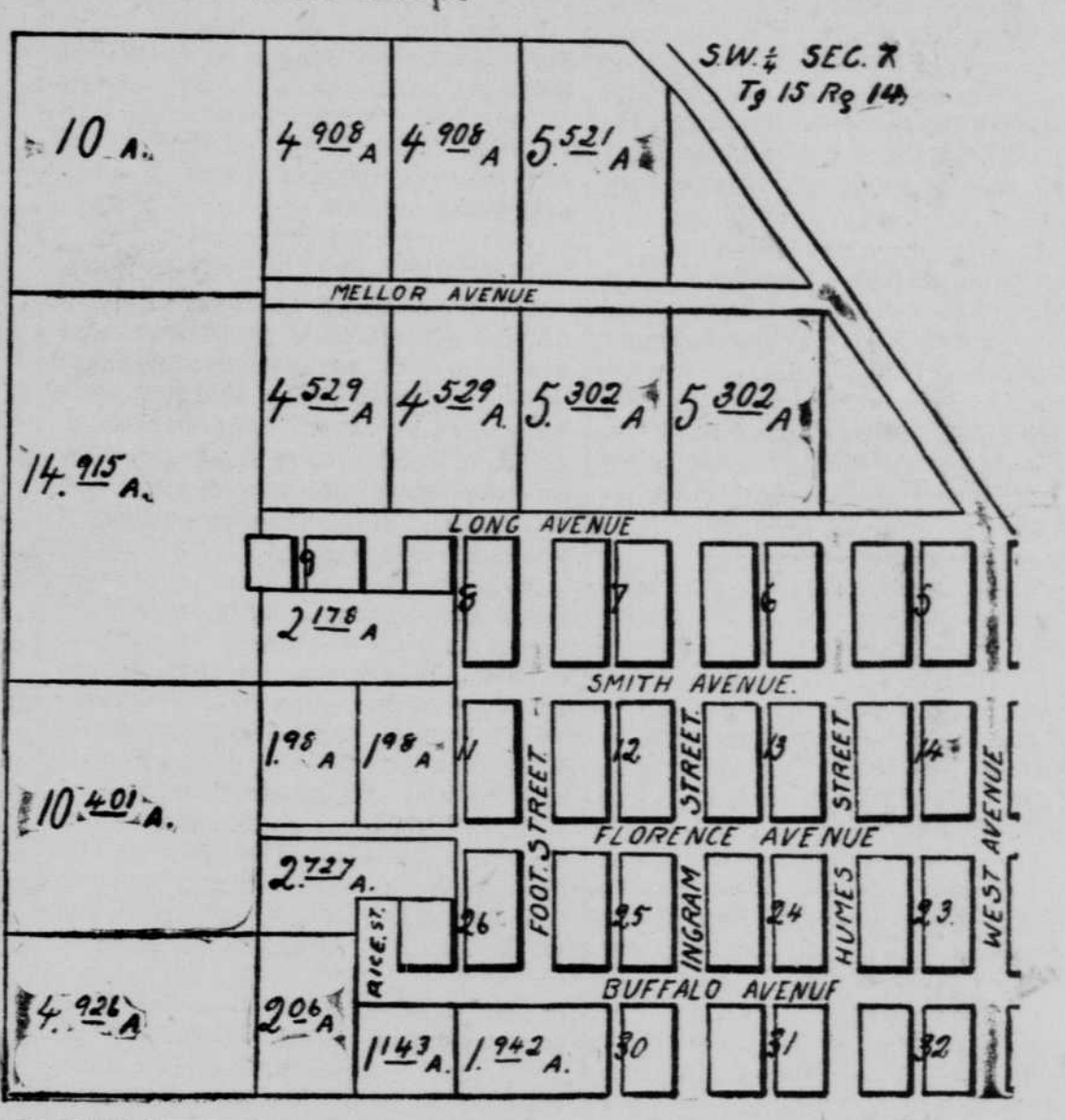
ARTICLE VIII.
The members of the Board of Directors shall be elected at the annual meeting of the stockholders, or at any special meeting called for that purpose.

ARTICLE IX.
The officers of said corporation shall consist of a President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer, and said officers shall be elected by the Board of Directors. The office of Treasurer may be held by either the President, Vice-President or Secretary. Said Board of Directors may also elect, appoint or employ a business manager for said corporation.

ARTICLE X.
Said corporation shall have a corporate seal, and all instruments affecting the title to real estate and all certificates of stock or bonds of said corporation shall be signed by the President or Vice-President and attested by the Secretary of the corporation, with the corporate seal affixed.
