From tests made it has been fully demonstrated that the cabbage "snake" or hair worm is a harmless thing, still many are vet afraid to eat cabbage Circular No. 62 has been recently issued by the bureau of entomology of the United States department of agriculture and it deals fully in regard to the matter. Mention was first made in 1003 of the "snake," but it was not recommended that no proxies be until 1904 that much attention was given to the subject by the public. Then the demand for cabbage and kraut was so small that many growers were financially crippled. Especially was this so in Tennessee, Missouri, Iowa, West Virginia and Virginia In the former state 85 per cent of the cabbage was lost. There was a death reported from eating a "snake" and an effort was made to locate the place, but it was like a will 'o the wisp, always in some other locality. The reported

death was traced to paris green which had been used to sprinkle on the
