B. & M. Wreck Near Comstock

The west bound B. & M. passenger train was wrecked last evening at the big curve between Comstock and Sargent by the spreading of rails. The engine passed safely over, but the two coaches left the track, one thrown across the track, the other being flung some distance from the road bed. Fortunately no one was killed or even seriously injured. We understand Frank Brewer was one of the passengers. The wrecking train went up to the scene early this morning and will have the road opened again in a few hours.

As a little out of the usual, the democrats of Nebraska this year propose to lead, in the matter of holding their state convention, rather than follow, as they have named Aug. 15, as their date—about a week prior to the republican state convention.

We hear it whispered that the democrats of Sherman county propose to have a fair division of offices this fall and rather incline to name the candidate for representative themselves, allowing their populist brethren to go after the county attorneyship, or vice versa.

E. Rosewater is now an avowed candidate for the U. S. senate, his son, Victor Rosewater, making the announcement in last Monday's Daily Bee. This means that Norris Brown will have to go some to head off a Rosewater boom that seems to be gathering with the force and rapidity of a modern tornado.

All is not serene among the opposers of republicanism in Nebraska. Geo. W. Berge, populist, wants another go at the governorship, while the democratic brethren want to sidetrack George with the attorney generalship and name the man for chief ruler themselves. George says "nixy weeden," or words to that effect, and says with him it will be nomination for governor or nothing. So, there.

As Bro. Brown is hearing of supposed republican candidates for office, he will of course have no objection to THE NORTHWESTERN mentioning some spoken of on his side of the house. As a starter, we this week mention the name of our honorable contemporary, Bro. A. E. Brown himself, whom we have heard spoken of in connection with the office of Representative in the coming state legislature. Now the opposition could go further to find a man and not be half so happy in their selection, and "Representative Brown of Sherman" would not sound so bad.

Articles of Incorporation, Sherman County Grain, Coal, Lumber and Live Stock Association

Know All Men By These Presents: That we, C. M. Snyder, Christ Zwick, W. H. Hughes, Eolla D. Hendrickson, J. B. Ford, James McBeth, A. W. Mason, John J. Zink, John N. Fisher, do associate ourselves together for the purpose of forming and becoming a corporation in the state of Nebraska, for the transaction of the business hereinafter described:

I. The name of the Corporation shall be the Sherman County Grain, Coal, Lumber and Live Stock Association.

The principal place of transacting its business shall be in the city of Loup City, county of Sherman, and state of Nebraska.

The nature of the business to be transacted by said corporation shall be:

1. To buy, sell, exchange, store and ship all kinds of grain and farm products, and to carry on and maintain a general grain business.

2. To buy, sell, exchange, keep in stock and deal in lumber, lime, hair, combed and all kinds of lumber and building material.

3. To buy, sell, exchange, keep in stock and deal in coal and other fuel, and to carry on wholesale and retail coal yards and to do a general coal business.

4. To buy, sell, exchange and deal in animals and live stock of all kinds and to carry on and maintain stock yards and a general stock shipping business.

5. To buy, sell, lease, rent, exchange, own, hold and deal in real estate as far as may be necessary, incidental or advantageous in conducting the above described forms of business.

6. Such business to be conducted at Loup City, Nebraska, and such other places in the United States as may be deemed expedient by the Board of Directors.

II. The authorized capital stock of said corporation shall be One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000), in shares of one share (\$100 each), to be paid on demand of the Board of Directors.

III. The existence of this Corporation shall commence on the 15th day of April, 1906, and continue during the term of twenty-five years unless sooner dissolved as provided by law.

IV. The business of said Corporation shall be conducted by a Board of Directors, not to exceed seven in number, to be elected by the stockholders, such elections to take place at such time and in such manner as shall be prescribed by the by-laws of said Corporation.

V. The officers of said Corporation shall be:

A. President, Secretary and Treasurer, who shall be chosen at the first regular meeting of the stockholders and shall hold their office for the period of one year, and until their successors shall be elected and qualified.

VI. The highest amount of indebtedness to which said Corporation shall at any time be subject shall not be more than the paid up capital stock, and no one except a farmer actually engaged in raising the soil shall be eligible to hold any office in this association.

VII. The manner of holding the meetings of the stockholders for the election of officers and the mode of conducting the business of the corporation shall be provided for in the by-laws adopted by the Corporation.

VIII. The highest number of shares that any person shall be allowed to subscribe for or own shall be fifty (50), and he shall be allowed one vote only as though he owned but one share.

IX. No shareholder of this Corporation shall be individually liable for more than double his share of stock subscribed.

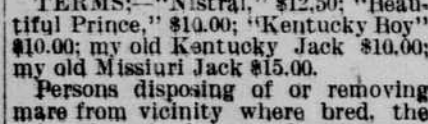
