Republican County Convention.
The Republican County Convention of Sherman county, Nebraska, is hereby called to be held at Fraternity Hall, in Loup City, in said county, on June 29th, 1906, at eleven o'clock in the forenoon, for the purpose of nominating a county attorney, a representative for this representative district and also to elect delegates to the state, senatorial and congressional conventions, to elect a County Central Committee and provide for the election of township committeemen, and to transact such other business as may properly come before said county convention.

The basis of representation at said convention to be one delegate for each 12 votes cast for the Hon. Chas. H. Letton, Justice of the Supreme Court, at the last general election, and one delegate at large for each township.

The republican county convention will be held in Loup City tomorrow. That convention will select candidates for representative and county attorney and select a delegation to the republican state convention. It is conceded the delegation to the state convention will be in the interest of Hon. John Wall, and so far as we have knowledge, there will be no opposition whatever to his having such delegation. As to the senatorial situation, we believe Messrs. Rosewater, Brown and Curry all have a following in this county, and a delegation favoring either one will hardly be in order, and certainly not as a unit sentiment. There has been no one mentioned so far from any reputable source for representative and the convention will undoubtedly make a selection without any pre-convention information as to who wants or will take said nomination. The county attorneyship question seems the one on which the most interest centers, as we have two well known lawyers announced as desiring the office, and possibly one other in the race who is understood as desiring the plum. THE NORTHWESTERN has no advice to offer, is not a would-be dictator, but rather believes in a majority rule, and whoever the convention sees fit to honor as its candidates will receive the hearty support of this paper, as well as the personal work of its editor.

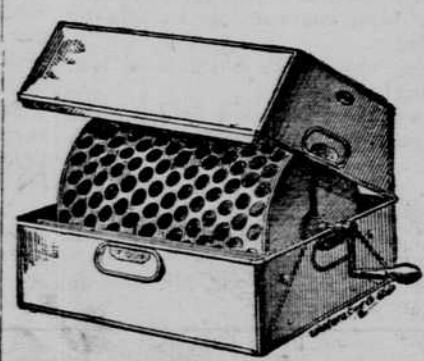
