

### Dragged to Death.

J. Q. Pray brought us Tuesday the details of a horrible accident and death in his neighborhood. Not returning, search was instituted and the body was found in the pasture with the skull crushed, back broken and otherwise horribly mutilated. A horse was quietly brousing by the still form, with a headstall on and the end of the halter tied around the boy's body, which told the sad story
