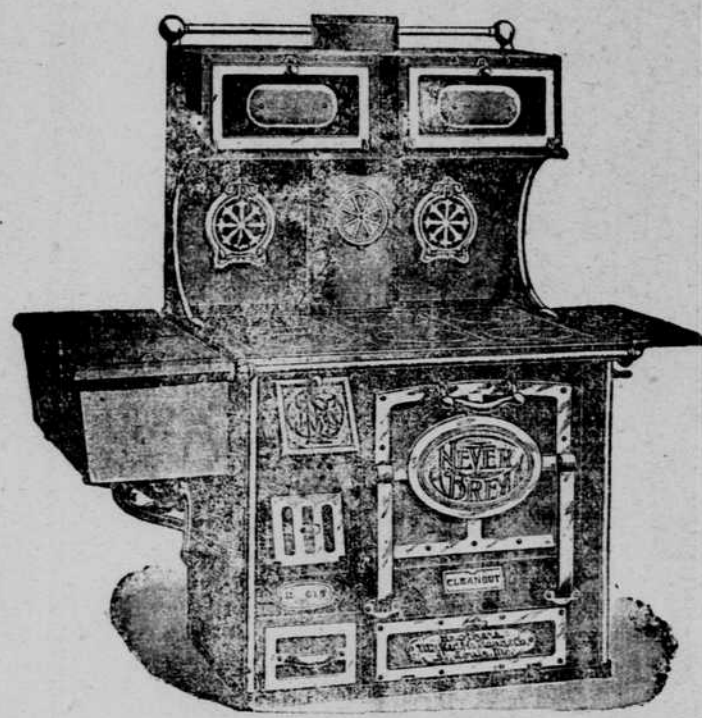

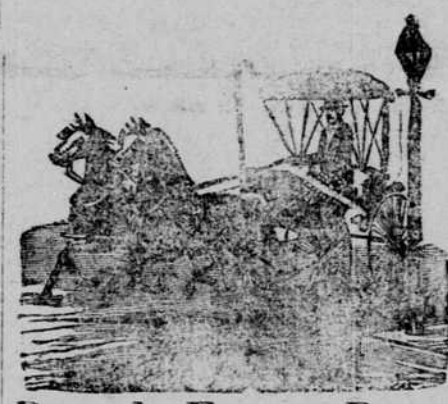

Granary to be boarded up with drop siding and crib with 1 inch cribbing; two doors on each end with hangers complete; granary to be partitioned into three bays of equal size, also one door leading to outside; ends of building to be boarded up to gable peak; building to be painted two coats.
