Cornelius J. Peters, of Rockville township, was appointed county assessor by the board, to fill vacancy made by the death of Lawrence Peters.

The county board selected sixty names from which to select a jury for the April term.

The following official bonds were approved by the board: James Carmody, overseer, Dist. No. 38; John Jewell, overseer, Dist. No. 7: M. A. Gilbert, overseer, Dist. No. 10; A. L. Enderle, treasurer, Webster township: F. A. Pinckney, justice of the peace, Webster township; A. J. Johnson, clerk, Loup City township; and State Journal Co., for printing.

The Peterson road was allowed by the board as prayed for, all claimants waiving damages.

The Tracy road petition was allowed as prayed for, providing Logan township pays all claims for damages.

On motion, board adjourned to March 6, 1907.


