Appropriation May Lapse.

The \$9,500 appropriated by the late legislature for building a brick addition to the hospital at the Soldiers' home at Grand Island is liable to lapse back into the state treasury. The State Board of Public Lands and Bulldings is not going to make any more improvements at the home until the title to the property is quieted in the state. The bil provides that this appropriation shal become available only after the title is vested in the state. When the board made an effort to get the tangle straightened out some of the original signers refused to sign the deed until they had been paid \$2,000. This the board had no authority to pay. Attorney General Thompson then brought sait to quiet title in the state. Should the state lose the suit then the board will not make any more permanent improvements. Should the state win the suit, there will be nothing to prevent the legislature from removing the home to Milford should it desire.




