

Worms in Hogs and Chickens.

Air slacked lime.....	4 pounds
Venetian red.....	2 pounds
Black Antimony.....	2 pounds
Soda.....	1 pound
Pulverized copperas.....	2 pounds
Pulverized asaefata.....	1/2 pound
Red Pepper.....	1/2 pound
Lewis lye.....	1 pound
Alum.....	1 pound
