# BIG ST. LOUIS FIRM ATTACKED. Receiver Is Asked for the State Trust

Company. St. Louis.-Minority stockholders Thursday afternoon filed a petition in the circuit court asking that a receiver be appointed for the State Trust Company, a St. Louis real estate firm

capitalized at \$1,000,000. The petition says that on May 20, 1907, the directors voted to increase the capital of the concern from \$500,-000 to \$1,000,000, representing that \$750,000 had already been paid in. At another meeting, it is alleged, the directors voted to pay back to the stockholders the \$250,000 that they paid into the company to increase its capital to \$1,000,000, but the money has not yet been paid back.
