

HEARING ON TARIFF.

House Committee Will Begin Taking

Testimony Tuesday. Washington-With the first hearing on the proposed revision of the tariff, scheduled for Tuesday, the active work of the committee on ways and means of the house of representatives will begin in Washington, although it has been progressing during the recess of congress, at Auburn, N. Y., the home of Representative Sereno Payne chairman of the committee. The hear ings will be completed before the Sixtieth congress convenes for its last session, but the program for the revision does not provide for the presentation of the subject to congress until the sixty-first congress is convened next March in special session

Judge Taft in his speech accepting the republican nomination for president outlined in these words the policy to be followed in revision:

"The republican doctrine of protection, as definitely announced by the republican convention of this year and by previous conventions, is that a tariff shall be imposed on all imported products, whether of the factory, farm or mine, sufficiently great to equal the difference between the cost course, include the difference between the higher wages paid in this country and the wages paid abroad and embrace a reasonable profit to the Amerlcan producer."
