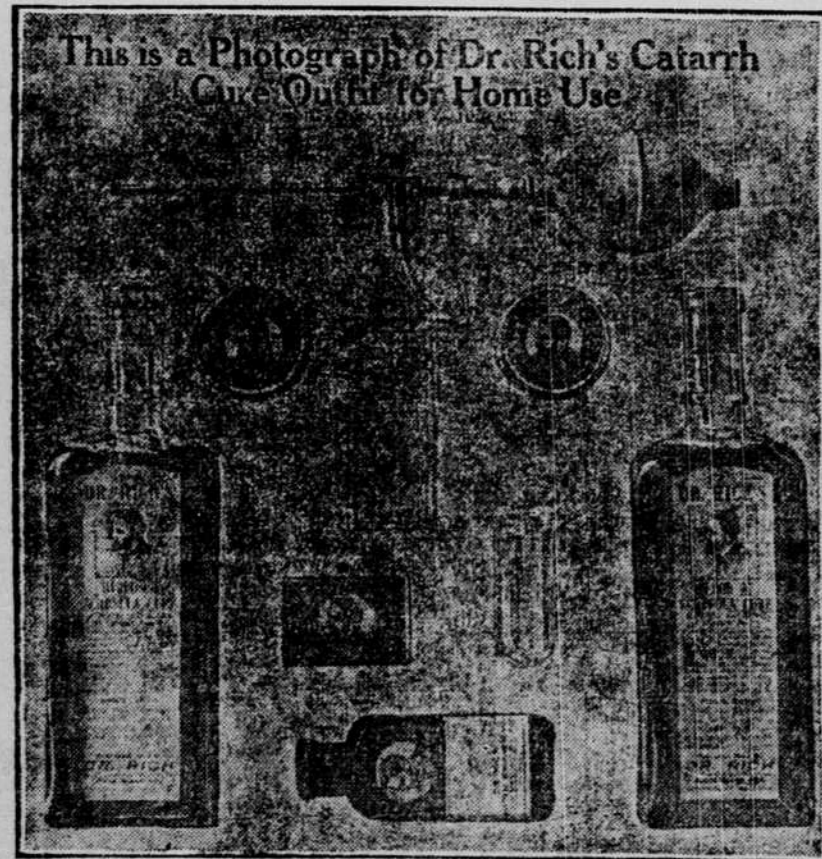

NEWS NOTES OF INTEREST FROM VARIOUS SECTIONS.

ALL SUBJECTS TOUCHED UPON

Religious, Social, Agricultural, Political and Other Matters Given Due Consideration.

Land in Cuming county brings \$100 per acre.

Waco schools, closed on account of smallpox, have again opened.

Wm. Kirminsky, a farmer of Webster county, was killed in a runaway.

Some time this week Hon. W. J. Bryan will speak at the National Corn Show in Omaha.

David S. Grim, grocer of Trementsel, has made a voluntary assignment of his stock to his creditors.

Mrs. E. H. Deerenfield was found dead in her bed at Ponca. She had retired feeling well as usual.

The Grand Army post at Ainsworth has been dissolved because there are not enough old soldiers left to fill the offices.

Oakland, Neb., advertised for a man to take the marshalling of that town and a man from Oakland, California, was secured.

The ferry boat at Decatur sank last week about 200 feet from the landing. There were nine teams on board at the time, but all were saved.

E. S. Davis of North Platte, who was offered the position of deputy commissioner of public lands and buildings, has decided not to accept.

The North Platte Y. M. C. A. that has been in a disorganized condition for some months, is taking on new life and gives great promise for the future.

Arrangements have been completed for the annual convention of the Nebraska Young Men's Christian association which will be held in Hastings, February 18 to 21.

Miss Nellie May Schlee, who has been on leave of absence for the last three months, has returned and has taken up her duties as training teacher in the Peru Normal.

The population of the state penitentiary November 30, 1908, was 433. Of this number, 334 were white, 29 colored, 9 Indians and 1 Japanese. Five were women, 2 white and 3 colored.

The population of the Soldiers' home at Milford December 1, 1908, as shown by the biennial report filed with the governor by Joseph Presson, commandant, is 132. There were received during the biennium 100; discharged and died, 132.

In a row at Decatur Elisha Ball was killed by Nick Farrens. Farrens and Ball had some words over a jug of whisky, when Farrens hit Ball in the head and knocked him off a sidewalk. Ball fell about four feet striking on his head, killing him instantly.

The per capita cost of maintaining the Soldiers' home at Grand Island for the year 1907 was \$198.66, according to the report of Commandant D. W. Hoyt, and for the year 1908 it was \$196.49. The total value of products raised on the farm during the biennium was \$20,571.14, of which there is now on hand products of the value of \$2,308.40.

According to the report of the Nebraska Public Library commission to the governor, there are now only five towns in Nebraska of more than 2,000 population which have not public libraries. These towns are Auburn, Alliance, North Platte, Schuyler and Wahoo. There are also twenty-five towns with population of less than 1,000 that have public libraries.

The state board of public lands and buildings rejected all bids for the construction of the cottage at the boys' industrial school at Kearney. Superintendent Sherman notified the board that the new cottage was not needed. When the appropriation was made for its construction, he said, the population of the school was 214 and growing, while now the population is 148 and growing less all the time.

Lena E. Ward, superintendent of the Nebraska Industrial Home at Milford, estimates the appropriation needed for this institution for the coming biennium at \$39,880, divided as follows: General repairs, \$11,000; maintenance, \$19,000; employes wages, \$5,080; salary of physician, \$1,600; salary of matron, \$1,200; salary of superintendent \$2,000. The per capita cost for the biennium, based on maintenance, is \$437.65.

H. P. Rankin of Hartington, who is known all over the United States as a fancy chicken raiser, and has carried away hundreds of premiums at the fancy chicken shows in the east as well as the west, will move to South Dakota and enter the banking business.

H. S. Mahan of Callaway, who recently returned from the vicinity of Redfern Table, some fifteen miles south of the city, brings in the report that a mountain lion, or some other large animal, is killing calves and colts and intimidating the people of that locality.

Superintendent McLaren of San Francisco's system of public parks was inspecting the work of restoring Union square to its former beauty, now that the little St. Francis has been removed.
