Broken Bow, Neb., April 18.—Two years after the mysterious disappear-ance of O. F. Hamilton from Mullen, C. W. Rector and himself had been unwilling witnesses to the murder, and charges H. G. McIntyre, who is now a Burlington brakeman, with having committed the crime.
