To all whom it may concern:
The commissioner appointed to re-
port upon the vacating of certain
streets and alleys lying in the Village
of Hazard, viz: To vacate and annual
all that part of Morven street, in the
Village of Hazard in the County of
Sherman and State of Nebraska, from
where said street intersects the right-
of-way of Chicago, Burlington and
Quincy Railroad, within said Village
of Hazard, and continuing north from
said right-of-way to the north line of
Block four (4), according to the re-
corded plat of Town or Village of
Hazard aforesaid, as the same now
appears on the records thereof in the
office of the county clerk of said
county; also all of that portion of
Clinton street in said Town or Vil-
lage of Hazard, west of the alley
crossing and Block four (4); and con-
tinuing to where said Clinton street
intersects said Morven street; also all
of that street or alley lying between
Block five (5) and the right-of-way of
the Chicago, Burlington and Quincy
Railroad and connecting said Morven

Board met pursuant to adjournment
of April 29, 1910, present being J. I.

Peters, Hijo Aden, H. Beck and
W. C. Dieterichs, clerk.

The following business was had
and done to-wit: Minutes of last
meeting read and on motion approved.
W. J. Fisher handed in a request for
James C. Hill that said James C. Hill
be allowed to file claims for damages
by reason of the establishing of the
Beck road along the S 1/2, SW 1/4, Sec.
11, T. 14, R. 16. Allowed on motion.

A dispute having arisen in Harri-
son township in regard to the Dun-
can and Dickerson proposed roads it
was on motion decided that the
whole board proceed to view said pro-
posed roads and settle said dispute
on Friday, June 17th, and report
their decision on the 18th.
Niels Jensen Rud requested the
board that he be allowed to file a
claim for damages on the establish-
ment of road No. 28, along the SW 1/4
of Sec. 25-16-14. Granted.
On motion the Road Committee is
to proceed to find whether the con-
ditions had been complied with in re-
gard to road No. 26 and whether the
vacation of road prayed for Jan. 1,
1905, should now be vacated, said
committee to report at next meeting.

On motion the Beck road petition
was granted as prayed for and ordered
established, recorded and platted, and
damages allowed as follows, H. K.
Friesen n 1/2, SW 1/4, 10-14-16, \$15; James
C. Hill s 1/2, SW 1/4, 11-14-16, \$15; Edward
Burgess s 1/2, SW 1/4, 10-14-16, \$21; J. W.
Vawter NW 1/4, 1 and N 1/2 NE 1/4, 2-14-16
\$60; C. J. Augustine N 1/2 NW 1/4, 2-14-16
\$25.
J. B. Whitaker was allowed lumber
for a bridge as was promised him on
the establishment of road No. 17, on
Nov. 10, 1909, to be placed in N 1/2,
6-15-14. Board adjourned till Satur-
day, June 17th, at 9 a. m.

ship was the best of the two roads,
viz: (Duncan and Dickerson) and the
most economically worked, therefore
the road in the Duncan petition was
allowed as prayed for and ordered
established, platted and recorded, said
road to be 40 feet wide and damages
allowed as follows: Anna Blodgett,
NW 1/4, NW 1/4, 20-14-16, \$25; James C. Hill
s 1/2, 8-14-16, \$12; Wilhelm Kohls, N 1/2
N 1/4, 8-14-16, \$5; Anna E. Dickerson, S 1/2
NE 1/4, 8-14-16 and SW 1/4, 17 and NE 1/4, 19-
14-16, \$220; John Heins, NW 1/4, 17-14-16,
\$22.
On motion the Roberts consent
road petition which prays for a road
on county line between Buffalo and
Sherman counties was allowed on
condition that when Buffalo county
established a road along said line it
prayed for in the Roberts petition,
then it shall be established in this
county.
On motion the clerk was ordered to
notify the authorities of City of Loup
City that the County Board will
make the city a present of the chains
and hitching posts around the pub-
lic square in Loup City to the City
of Loup City, providing the city will
keep them up in proper condition, or
the board will have said posts and
chains removed and sold to the high-
est bidder inside of 10 days. Chair-

man of county board to attend to
this matter.
The taxes on Lot 19, block 13 in
L. & K. addition to Loup City and
Lot 5 Block 10 original town of Loup
City, not having been paid for 21
years, it is on motion hereby ordered
by the board that the County At-
torney forthwith commence action
in district court of Sherman county
for the foreclosure of the tax lien
upon said lots.

On motion board adjourned until
1 o'clock p. m.

County Board met at 1 o'clock p. m.
pursuant to adjournment for dinner,
all present except C. J. Peters.
E. A. Smith requested the County
Board to furnish more vault room

motion allowed said request and
authorized Chairman Depew to hire
part of the vault in the First National
Bank of Loup City at a rental
per annum of \$12 and also on
motion the county judge was author-
ized to remove such old records to
said vault in said bank.

On the request of County judge for
a book case and typewriter desk for
use in his office, said request was on
motion granted and the County Judge
authorized to purchase said furni-
ture and charge to county.
The Thole road petition was then
allowed and ordered established, said
road along the B. & M. right-of-way
on County poor farm to be 40 feet
wide, rest of road full width and
damages to land owners along said
road allowed as follows: A. M. Rob-
bins N 1/2, SW 1/4, 15-15, \$75; A. L. Zim-
merman S 1/2, SW 1/4, 36-16-15, \$75.

On motion the proper authorities
in Loup City are ordered to remove
the old bandstand from public square
in Loup City, Neb., as it is unsafe
and a public nuisance.
A resolution on motion adopted
by the county board ordering the
county clerk to give due notice to
such persons who were sent to the
hospital at Lincoln by the commis-
sioners of insanity of the county of
Sherman to be there treated for
dipsomania, to re-imburse the county
for said expense, according to law.
The following official bonds were
approved, C. H. Wall, road overseer,
Harrison township; Peter Graack,
road overseer, Loup City township;
Dan McDonald, road overseer, Loup
City township.

On motion C. H. French was given
the job of mowing and cleaning up
the court house square in Loup City,
and he is authorized to notify such
persons who pasture their horses on
the lawn of said square to desist from
doing so under penalty of the law.

On motion board adjourned sine
die.
