He was a candidate two years ago for the senate, but was defeated at the primaries by Gould, a wet candidate. Gould in turn was defeated by a dry democrat, Rodinson. This fall Culley tried it again. He was defeated again at the primaries by C. A. Clark of Ravenna. As Rodinson was again a candidate this made two dry senatorial candidates in the field and we see Culley stepped into the breach and fled by petition. When he fled for the nomination he took an oath that he would abide by the results of the primaries. This was but a moral obligation and was once disregarded by the defeated candidates. Now he is coming in for all kinds of criticism in his own county and in Buffalo county, which is also in the district. Loup City, Neb., Sept. 20th, 1910. County Board met pursuant to adjournment of Aug. 10, 1910. Present, C. J. Peters, J. H. Welty, W. O. Brown, W. Rewolinski, Henry Beck, J. L. Depew, chairman, W. C. Dieterichs, clerk, R. H. Mathew, county attorney; Aden being absent, and the following business was done: Minutes of meetings held, including Aug. 10th meeting, read and on motion accepted as read.

The Teichmeier road petition which was disallowed at last meeting was at request of F. Teichmeier and other citizens of Rockville township on motion reconsidered. Said petition was then allowed, F. Teichmeier waiving all damages; damages allowed as follows: David Seifert nw 24 and w 2 sw 12-13-13, \$33; Chris Nielsen, se 12-13-13, \$15; Klaus R. Klausen, ne 12-13-13, \$15. Said road to be 40 feet wide.

T. S. Caddy came before board and said he would accept \$55 in full payment for damages by reason of the establishment of the Dunker road along north line of ne 13-15-14 and withdraw his suit against county. On motion he was allowed \$50.

At request of county treasurer he was authorized by board to distribute into the proper funds, the taxes that the C. B. & Q. and U. P. R. R. and John Minshull paid under protest during November and December of 1909, time for appeal having passed.

On motion adjourned till Sept. 21 at 10 o'clock a. m.

A resolution was adopted in regard to the proposed sale of poor farm and other county property, which will be published later in the county papers.
Committee on claims reported having taken the claims of Wm. Mizner, Frank Dzingle and A. C. Lowry for taxes and allowed all the rest of the claims. Said report was on motion accepted and orders to draw warrants on the respective funds.

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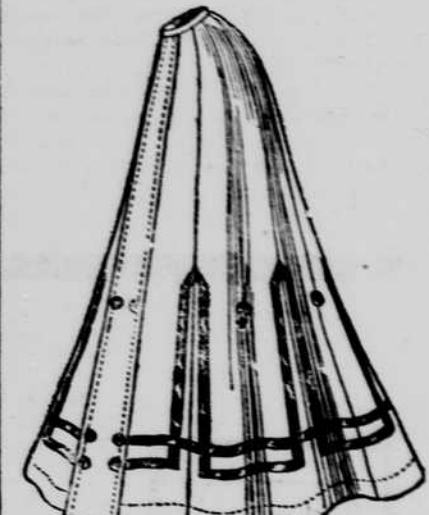
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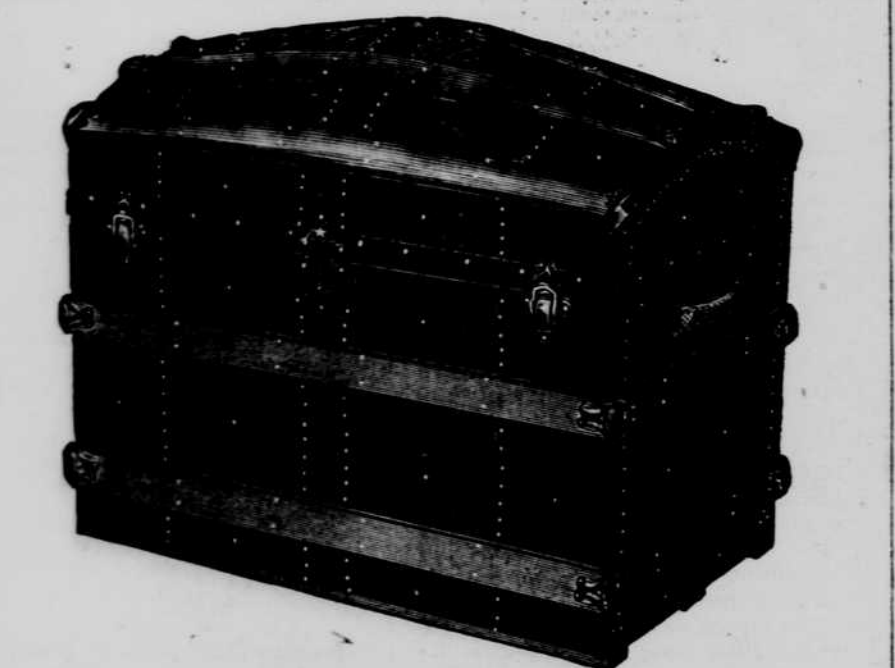
