It was a great and enthusiastic crowd that greeted Hon. Chester H. Aldrich, republican candidate for governor, at the opera house Tuesday evening of this week, every chair being filled and standing room taken

to the very doors, many ladies being unable to find seats, and fully one-third of the audience composed of farmers and their wives coming in from distances ranging up to fifteen miles. The applause was magnificent, showing the sentiment as in favor of the principle of county option from nearly all present. Not only that, but during the speech of perhaps an hour and a half, the most attention was paid the speaker, only a very few leaving the house before the close of the speech, and those being close to the door and who were unable to obtain seats. The speaker was introduced by Committee-man Wilber S. Waite, who is also candidate for representative, doing so in a few well chosen words, and also taking occasion to remind them not to forget there was also a candidate for the lower house to be chosen, his next turn of thought to himself gaining a round of applause. Mr. Aldrich paid his respects to the brewers and distillers, whom he claimed were sending paid hirelings throughout the state, spreading slanders reports of a personal character against him, all of which he averred were a tissue of lies couched by malicious and evil minded character assassins of the whiskey trust. The defeat of county option he showed disfranchised 75 per cent of the vote of the state, while the 25 per cent which respects to the villages and towns fastened the evils of the saloon system upon the entire people outside the towns and villages who paid 80 per cent of the tax imposed by reason of court expenses caused by their existence. He also paid his respects to Iahiman, not a democratic candidate for governor, as the democratic party had no candidate for that exalted office, but as a man who was running for governor as a candidate of the brewers and distillers. He had the large audience which him from start to finish, and won many a vote for himself and the cause of county option. The crowd which greeted him was by far the largest assembled to hear a political speaker within the past ten or more years.

It is too late to make extended mention of the magnificent rally at Litchfield last evening, accorded Hon. Chester H. Aldrich and several other candidates for office who appeared with him. The writer went over to the meeting with W. S. Waite by auto, driven by that prince of chauffeurs, Wm. J. Rice, and found our sister town on the west side alive with bustling humanity, a large per cent of whom were nearby farmers, brought in to hear the next governor discuss the issues of the day. As the hour of 8 o'clock drew near the opera house became crowded to its utmost capacity, all standing room taken and large numbers not being able to get hardly within range of the voices of the speakers. On the stage were Chester H. Aldrich, candidate for governor; Walter A. George, candidate for state treasurer; A. Clark, for state senator; Wilber S. Waite for representative; R. P. Starr for county attorney; Committee-man George Wolfe, J. T. Campbell and a representative of the press. R. P. Starr acted as presiding officer, owing to the lateness of the hour when the presiding officer proper arrived and introduced each candidate in a neat and appropriate manner, only casually alluding to his own candidacy and the wish they might remember him favorably at the coming election. Messrs. Clark, Waite and George were called in turn, each being cordially received. Mr. Aldrich received an ovation, plainly showing his audience was almost to a man in hearty sympathy with him and the cause he represents, especially that of county option. The hundreds shaking his hand at the close gave evidence that the township that at the primary gave only two votes for Iahiman was going to be unanimous in helping land him in the gubernatorial chair. It was one of the finest political gatherings and the most closely attentive to the speakers we have ever attended.

LEGAL NOTICE Notice to the electors of Sherman county, Nebraska, submitting the question as to the sale of the East half of Section thirty-five, Township sixteen and Range fifteen in said county, otherwise known as the "Poor Farm."

Resolution of the County Board of Supervisors of Sherman county, Nebraska, ordering publication of the question as to the sale of the "Poor Farm," submitting the same to the voters of said county.

WHEREAS, the County of Sherman of the State of Nebraska, is the owner of the East half of Section thirty-five, Township sixteen and Range fifteen, West of the Sixth P. M., otherwise known as the "Poor Farm," which is of the reasonable value of \$30,000 and upwards, and is unable to secure a reasonable interest upon the value of said land, receiving only \$207.00 per year in rental, a large portion of which is taken for expenses and repairs, and whereas the said County of Sherman cannot receive the value of said land, and has no use for same, the very few paupers in said county being housed in private families and looked after by the law, and whereas the proceeds of said land, if sold and applied on the bonded indebtedness of said county, would save said county in the neighborhood of \$200.00 per year in interest, in addition to the amount realized therefrom in taxes.

Now, therefore, the undersigned said County Board of Supervisors deem it for the best interests of the said county that said land be sold, after having been duly advertised for sale at public auction to the highest bidder, the terms to be one-half of purchase price in cash, the balance to be secured by a first mortgage on said premises, to run five years and draw interest annually at four per cent in interest, in addition to the amount of all bids in case said bids are not for an adequate amount, the question being submitted to a vote of the electors of said Sherman county, Nebraska, being:
