Now is the Time to Swat the Fly

If you see a fly walking over the food and dishes, or alighting on your baby's face, remember that he is a messenger of disease and death, says the July Woman's Home Companion.
The rules for dealing with the fly nuisance, published by the Merchants' Association of New York, and widely circulated by them, are worth reprinting. We repeat our suggestion that an excellent work for any live woman's club would be to reproduce these rules on cards and distribute them broadcast.
Keep the flies away from the sick, especially those ill with contagious diseases. Kill every fly that strays into the sick room. His body is covered with disease germs.
Do not allow decaying material of any sort to accumulate on or near your premises. All refuse which tends in any way to fermentation, such as bedding straw, paper waste and vegetable matter should be disposed of or covered with lime and kerosene in good order; that it does not leak, is up-to-date and not exposed to flies. Pour kerosene into the drains.
Cover food after a meal; burn or bury all stable refuse. Screen all food for sale.
Screen all windows and doors, especially the kitchen and dining-room.
Burn pyrethrum powder in the house to kill flies.
Don't forget, if you see flies, that their breeding-places are in or near filth. It may be behind the door, under the table, or in the cuspidor.
If there is no dirt and filth, there will be no flies.
If there is a nuisance in the neighborhood, it would be advisable to write at once to the health department.
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Notice of Articles of Incorporation of the Depew Disc Sharpener Company.

Sherman County, Nebraska.
Notice is hereby given that the Depew Disc Sharpener Company, a corporation organized and existing under the laws of the State of Nebraska, at a regular meeting of its stockholders held at its office in Loup City, Nebraska, on February 25th, 1911, by the unanimous vote of its stockholders, adopted the following Articles of Incorporation, and also in the office of the County Clerk of Sherman County, Nebraska, to-wit:
Article I.—Know all men by these presents: That we, James I. Depew, John W. Long and William H. Mellor, hereby associate ourselves together for the purpose of forming a corporation in the State of Nebraska for the transaction of business as hereinafter described.
Article II.—The name of the corporation shall be the "Depew Disc Sharpener Company," and its principal place of business shall be at Loup City, Sherman County, Nebraska.
Article III.—The general nature of the business to be transacted by said corporation shall be the manufacture, sale and distribution of disc sharpeners and appliances and accessories thereto, and any and all kinds of machines and machinery. To buy, hold, encumber, operate, sell and convey lands, patents and other property of other corporations engaged in the manufacture or sale of any such disc sharpener, appliances or machinery. To buy, hold and sell stock in any such corporation. To buy, sell and encumber all property, real, personal and mixed, necessary in the conduct of said business and to do everything necessary or customary in the conduct thereof.
Article IV.—The authorized capital stock of said corporation shall be two hundred dollars (\$200) in shares of one hundred dollars (\$100) each, ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) of which shall be paid in before commencing business. One hundred (100) shares aggregating ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) shall be preferred stock and the balance of one hundred (100) shares shall be common stock. Each share outstanding shall entitle the holder to receive an annual guaranteed income of six (6) per cent, and no more, of the face value of said stock, and for overvaluing the net revenue of said corporation shall be pledged, and if that is insufficient to meet such payment, any year, the annual income of said preferred stock for said year shall be paid out of the assets and property of said corporation and stock shares shall constitute a first lien upon all assets and property of the corporation after the payment of its debts shall first be used in discharging said stock and redeeming and retiring the same on the basis of one dollar five (1.50) for each one dollar (\$1.00) of the face of said preferred stock together with accrued interest, and the balance of said assets and property thereafter remaining and the profits thereof shall be distributed in equal parts among the holders of the common stock then issued and outstanding, and said corporation reserves the right to take up and cancel any of its stock at any annual dividend paying date upon said above described basis of one dollar and five cents (\$1.05) and accrued interest, and during said period any of said preferred stock may be taken up by said corporation and cancelled at any time by agreement between said corporation and the holders thereof.
The holders of preferred stock shall have no voice in the management of said company, and no vote in any meeting of stockholders. The management and conduct of the business of said company to rest with the holders of the common stock acting by and through the Board of Directors as herein provided; provided, that said corporation shall issue no bonds while any of said preferred stock is outstanding.
Article V.—The existence of said corporation shall begin on the 1st day of March, 1911, and end on the first day of March, 1912, and said corporation can be dissolved prior to said mentioned date only by the action of the holders of two-thirds (2/3) of the common stock of said corporation, which action must be entered on the records of said corporation.
Article VI.—The business of said corporation shall be conducted by a board of not less than three and not more than five directors, to be elected by the holders of the common stock, such election to be held on the first Tuesday of March in each year and to be conducted in such a manner as shall be described by the by-laws of said corporation. Said directors shall hold their office for a period of one year and their successors shall be elected and qualified. The incorporators thereof at their first meeting after the filing of these articles shall elect directors until the first Tuesday of March, 1911.
Article VII.—The officers of said corporation shall be a President and a Secretary, who shall be chosen by the Board of Directors, and shall hold their offices for a period of one year and their successors shall be elected and qualified. Two or more persons may be elected to any one office, and by one and the same person. No salary shall be paid except to officers who take an active part in the management of the business of the company, devoting thereto a greater portion of their time and effort. No officer, including the position of manager and sales manager, shall receive a salary in excess of \$100 advance of the original amount per year for a period of four years thereafter. After the expiration of said four-year period, the annual salaries of the President, Secretary, Treasurer and Sales Manager, to-wit: of all officers and employees a vote of all the stockholders shall be taken, and the superintendent of the factory of said company shall retain the same until the expiration of said period; provided, that at the time of any year after March 1st, 1911, in addition to said salary, and as part of the compensation for services so rendered, a percentage of the gross annual business of said company for said year, may be paid to said officers and employees named in such an aggregate amount that the sum of the regular salary of such officer or employee plus the percentage so paid shall not exceed five (5) per cent of the gross annual business of said company for the year. No director shall ever receive more than one salary at any given time.
Article VIII.—The highest amount of indebtedness to which said corporation shall at any time be subject shall not exceed two-thirds (2/3) of the common capital stock.
Article IX.—The annual meeting of the stockholders shall be held on the first Tuesday of March in each year, for the election of directors and for the transaction of such other business as may properly come before the meeting, and the methods of conducting the business of the corporation shall be provided in the by-laws adopted by the Board of Directors. Only holders of the common stock shall be entitled to vote at said meeting.
Article X.—These articles may be amended or any regularly called meeting of the stockholders, upon the vote of a majority of the common stock outstanding; provided, that Articles IV and VII hereof shall not be amended while any of said preferred stock is outstanding.

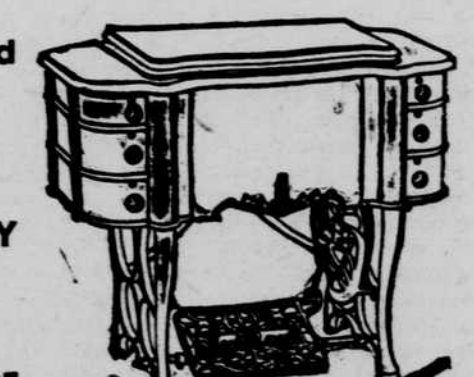
