The armer is advised to give the wrig ing protectors of alfalfa as much are and consideration as he does the aelpful hen and the rat terrier that keeps the rodents from undermining he corn crib and wheat bins.

Bright and early every morning the armer should gather his bull snakes about him and hasten to the alfalfa field, where the gophers and the moles are wont to cavort in the dew and alfalfa.

"Whoop-la. There he goes! After him, Jimmy Bull! Right down that hole, Bill Bull! Wriggle along there now, you old sinner! After 'em, ole snake! Sic 'em, Bull. Swaller 'em whole."

These and similar cries the farmer boy would give as his trained bull snakes go wriggling through the al falfa and into the gophers' holes. It ought to be lots of fun.
