NOT HARD TO STOP HAZING Good Results Have Followed Determined Purpose to Put an End to College Foolishness. Hazing, which used to be rampant at West Point and Annapolis, has been pretty well suppressed through the energy with which it has been combated by the federal authorities. Under the urgings of the Inquirer and other newspapers, which detested and denounced a brutal practice, congress enacted legislation whose loyal and energetic enforcement has served to stamp the evil out. An instance of it is reported once in a while, but usually in a materially modified and comparatively unobjectionable form, and the convicted offender is punished without any demoralizing indulgence. This is a gratifying reform for whose consummation President Taft de serves a large measure of credit.
