Wheat is the Best

The agricultural department at Washington gives out in its report of the crop season that the winter wheat of the country is in the bumper class, being 1-4 per cent better than last year, and 1-3 per cent better than the average for the past five years. Corn is way below expectations, standing the lowest in percentage at this time of any time for the past ten years.

While oats fall below the average for several years it is so little below that it is scarcely noticeable. Barley falls off about ten per cent over the average for the last ten years. Rye shows up good, the quality being a few points better than for the past ten years and the yield being about equal. Other cereals about hold their own for former years.
