



"Candidates for county superintendent, county, district and supreme judges, as well as candidates for regent of the state university will not appear on the primary ballot," according to the belief of Judge Button of Hastings, who holds that there is no reason for the names going on the primary ticket, as the new law contemplates taking these offices out of politics.

North Loup nearly made it unanimous last week Wednesday, when by a vote of 113 to 24 they voted to bond the village for \$20,000 for a water works and electric light system. It is the only village in the Loup valley to vote municipal bonds for both a water works and electric light system.
