Shoulders are often formed on both sides of the road, which prevent storm water from flowing into the side ditches, retaining it in the ruts 70,827 and softening the roadway. These 76,803 ruts and shoulders can be entirely 41,510 eliminated with the road machine or split-log drag. The width of the earth road will 189,140 depend on the traffic. As a rule, twenty-five or thirty feet from ditch to ditch is sufficient if the road is properly crowned. Ordinarily the only ditches needed are those made with the road machine, which are wide and shallow.

Months in Each Year Highways Are Unusable.

If you want to know how badly Illinois needs good roads, ask the rural mail carriers. There are nearly three thousand of them in the state, their routes cover 66,628 miles of road, and they are out every working day in the year. When the subject is roads, the rural mail carrier knows what he is talking about.

Evidence collected from 2.724 rural mail carriers shows that most highways of Illincis deserve the name of trails, rather than of roads.
