According to said arrangement and apportionment, the precincts will be entitled to representation as follows:

Oak creek two, Logan four, Washington three, Elm two, Webster two, Loup City twelve, Ashton three, Rockville three, Clay three, Harrison four, Scott two, Hazard three, Bristol two. Assessed valuation on nei and sei and si swi sec. 4-16-13 reduced \$517

Valuation of improvements sei of 8-15-14 reduced \$300.

The Gross receipts of Sherman county amounting to \$15,742.25 were on motion deducted from their assessment for the reason that the Supreme Court has held section 6168 unconstitutional and that the gross receipt is not a proper basis to determine the franchise valuation or value of the intangible property.

Board on motion, deducted \$1100 from the personal valuation of R. Farnsworth, guardian, for the reason that above amount is loaned out on real estate and the mortgage contains the tax clause.

Board on motion reduced the valuation on sei of 5-15-15, \$600.

Tax protest on lots 23 and 24, block 6 original town of Loup City was on motion allowed and the treasurer ordered to refund same for the reason that 25 per cent of the improvements assessed were not subject to assessment at the time of assessment.

Board on motion reduced the valuation on part of sei of 12-15-14, \$900.

Board on motion adjourned till August 11th 1914.
