



Nearly One Million Acres-To Construct Big Barrage.

London .- It is said, on good authority, that when Lard Kitchener arrives here shortly he will bring with him details of a great irrigation scheme, which will put nearly a million Egyptian acres on the "cotton map." The plans for the construction of a bar-

rage on the White Nile, about 371/2 miles above Khartum, are now being drawn up by the Egyptian authorities. In deciding on this work the government has been influenced by the great success of the Assiut barrage and the Esneh barrage. This vast

weir will act as a necessary auxiliary to the drainage schemes in northern Egypt. Within two or three years the area in the delta will have been reclaimed, and then the new barrage will be urgently required. At present noth-


