# 340,000 ACRE FEET AVAILABLE

Water From Platte Each Spring Would Insure Wheat Crop in Three Counties.

Lincoln.-Government and Nebraska engineers have filed a report favoring the use of water from the Platte river for irrigation in the counties of Phelps, Kearney and Gosper. The report is signed by R. F. Walters, supervising engineer, U. S. R. S., Mr. Pease, engineer, U. S. R. S., George Condra, director Nebraska water supply survey, Donald D. Price, state engineer of Nebraska. The engineers find 340,000 acre feet available for irrigation in the counties mentioned. It can be used from March 1 to June 30 of each year, thus insuring a good wheat crop, also alfalfa and possibly the water can be used in raising corn. State Engineer Price found several large ditches using water at this time for the purpose of soaking fields, some of which have not yet been cleared for the corn crop. Large numbers of farmers have responded to this invitation Instruction begins at 9 o'clock and lasts throughout the day. No charges are made for the instruction.

#### Car Company Taxes.

George Holcomb, assistant tax commissioner of the Union Pacific railroad company, has payed the annual tax of the Pacific Express Company, a private car company. The tax is \$4.571.67 for the year 1913. The tax ject being carried out. on all private car companies this year amounts to \$13,333.63. Formerly it was collected by counties in which the cars ran, but it is now paid direct into the state treasury.

#### New Telephone Company.

The People's Telephone company, an organization recently formed for the purpose of competing with the Lincoln Telephone company in the village of Sterling, Johnson county, has asked the railway commission for leave to issue \$50,000 of capital stock.


#### New State Banks.


