The door leading into the barn was found tied with a big rope, which the men cut away and entered, finding the body sus pended as aforesaid with a small quarter-inch rope fastened to the joist, while about a foot below was standing in an upright position the body of the ill-fated man, his feet almost firmly on the ground, his hands by his side and his head thrown backward with the rope around his neck, where evidently he had strangled to death. The men instantly cut the rope and laid the body down, hoping to find some signs of life. Dr. Dickenson was then summoned and found that life must have become extinct some hours
