Tender Vegetables.

The spring has been exceedingy uniform in temperature since the melting of the snow, but it is well to remember that it is customary to have frost in May. Do not be in to great a hurry to set out the plants from the hot bed. A checked plant is said never to fully recover. The tender vegetables are beans, corn, cucumbers, eggplant, melons, orka, pepper, pumpkin, squash, sweet potato and tomato,

While it is generally useless to try to rush the season, still it may be well to risk a few hills of corn and beans for an early crop, but be sure to cover with news papers or litter on cold nights.


