Total Prussian losses to August 24 in killed, wounded and missing were 1,740,836, according to an Amsterdam

Germany's fleet of Zeppelins have been repainted a leaden gray, same as the color of battleships, which renders them difficult to be seen even when flying beneath the clouds.

To make it possible for all soldiers who receive a furlough at the front to visit with their families, the German government will grant free transportation to man of every rank until the end of the war.

The French aviator Eugene Gilbert, who escaped from Switzerland, where he was interned after flying over Swiss territory, has surrendered himself to the Swiss authorities by order of the French government.

Passengers on the Holland-American line steamer Ryndam, arriving in Amsterdam, bring a report that a British transport with 2,000 Canadian troops on board, was torpedoed off Scilly islands on August 15. It is said about 1,000 men were saved.

FRANK GRAND JURY IS UNABLE

TO INDICT ANY ONE.

MANY WITNESSES EXAMINED

Find From Investigation Officers of the Law and Citizens Knew Nothing of Crime Beforehand.

Marietta, Ga.-The Cobb county grand jury reported that it had been ber 11. unable to find enough evidence after a two days' examination of witnesses to indict any one for the lynching of Leo M. Frank. The report stated:

"We have found several clues, but we have been unable to find any one who could identify any party. We have done our best, under our oath, and we regret to state that we have been unable to find enough evidence to indict any one for this crime."

After it is stated that the jury had the active co-operation of Governor Harris, the state attorney general, Solicitor Herbert Clay, and other officials of Cobb county, the report adds: "We have been unable to connect anybody with the perpetration of this editor of the Osceola Democrat. offense or to identify any one who was connected with it, although we nished us by officers and other parties a tree. and have followed up letters signed and unsigned, and to this end we have subpoenaed and examined many witnesses in an effort to disclose the per- | ber 15. petrators of this crime, but none of these witnesses could identify any of

Upwards of thirty-five witnesses were examined. They included the chief of police and other citizens of Atlanta and persons in every walk of life in Marietta. Anonymous letters referred to in the report are still being received by officials of Cobb county and others, but the tendency is to ignore them. Marietta is not in the frenzied state of turmoil that has been pictured, said Solicitor Clay.

To Take Up Commerce Question.

C .- With both oral and written assurances from the German government, transmitted through Count von Bernstorff, the German ambassador, to the state department regarding Germany's submarine policy, officials of the Washington government now look hopefully forward for an ultimate and satisfactory settlement of the submarine problem. Assurance is given that liners will not The unconditional release of Pitch- be sunk by German submarines withliners do not try to escape or offer

Germany's next communication, it was said authoritatively, will be a formal disavowal of the sinking of the Arabic and reparation will be made for American lives lost in the disaster if the attack was made by a German submarine.

With the situation growing around the Arabic incident out of the way, Germany's reply to the last American note on the Lusitania will be forthcoming. If that is satisfactory to the United States it is believed that the Washington government will then turn its attention to the problem of neutral commerce. A note to Great Britain is already in course of preparation. The two issues, however, are being kept entirely distinct, President Wilson having consistently refused to allow the question of neutral commerce to be involved along with the submarine problem.

450,000 Horses and Mules to War...

Washington, D. C .- The agricultural department reports that 425,000 horses and mules have been shipped out of the United States for European belligerents. Purchase of the animals has been a big boom in the market for medium class horses. Government experts have been watching the recfew high bred horses have been exported with the result that prizes for ordinary equines have increased. Most of the borses have gone to England, but many shipments have been made to France and some to Italy. The supply is not being seriously depleted, government officials estimating that there are today approximately 21,-000,000 horses and 4,000,000 mules in the early volumes. this country. .

To do so would be to invoke the Gerdes law of the 1911 session-a statute which some of the attorneys about the city say is unconstitutional. With the check of the three state officers on the funds and with the assurance of the treasurer's bonding companies that they would not disturb him for following this procedure he would have no object in at tacking the method.
