#### WHEN THE WORLD REVISES TARIFFS.

Professor Henry C. Emery, formerly chairman of the tariff board appointed under a republican administration, has an interesting article in New York Annalist entitled "When the World Revises Tariffs." Dr. Emery discusses the "most favored nation clause" and its interpretation in America and in Europe, the American interpretation demanding a quid pro quo, while in Europe a concession granted to a third coun try, under the clause becomes ipso facto extended to the other party of the tretaty. "It is highly probable," says Dr. Emery, "that this great principle will be abandoned when the war closes."
