The United States department of agriculture, in the tabulation of the estimated total value of thirteen crops, towit, corn, wheat, oats, barley, rye, buckwheat, flaxseed, rice, potatoes, sweet potatoes, tame hay, tobacco, and lint cotton, gives the total valuation of the aggregate of the above named crops. From these figures of all states with a valuation of more than one hundred million we have taken as a basis the rural population in each state named and find that the per capita in the various states from the agricultural production of the farms for 1916, is, in order, as follows:


