Personal, Political, Foreign and Other Intelligence Interesting to the General Readers.

U. S. Teutonic War News.

Bases for training of aviation, artillery, infantry and medical units have been opened in France to start the education of portions of Pershing's Stambouls for the front.

Stinking of the American steamer Grace by a German submarine, and the killing of three men, one of them an American, and the injury of two members of the naval armed guard, has been announced.

A dry zone five miles wide, unless there is a city or town within that limit, is to be thrown around all camps for the mobilization or training of troops under new regulations made public at the War department.

Reports that the activities of the Industrial Workers of the World in the west recently had been financed by German gold have failed of substantiation after an exhaustive investigation by agents of the Department of Justice.

Representatives of fifteen farmers' organizations conferred with members of the food administration and adopted resolutions protesting against the plan of senate leaders to fix a price of \$1.75 a bushel for wheat in the food control bill.

That an American navy vessel had sighted what apparently was the periscope of a submarine near Hampton Roads was reported to the navy department. It is a known fact that U-boats are operating farther from their home bases than previously.

The United States has been officially invited by the allied governments to participate in the inter-allied conference to be held in Paris, but has decided it will not be necessary to take part in such meetings not directly affecting this country's part in the war.

President Wilson has issued a proclamation drafting the entire national guard of the country into the United States army to date from Aug. 5, next, and also calling the regiments out for active service. This completes the last step necessary to make the entire national guard available for duty in France.

General News.

Hundreds of government troops were killed in Francisco Vila's attack on Parral, Chihuahua, just recently, according to arrivals from Parral, who reached El Paso, Texas.

Philadelphia hotels and restaurants will follow New York's lead in omitting beef from their menus on at least one day a week in the near future.

With a population of 6,504,185, New York City leads its nearest competitor —Chicago—by nearly 3,000,000 people, according to a new census estimate.

Tests made in the University of Kansas bacteriologist laboratories of samples of court-plaster thought to have been inoculated with tetanus germs, have failed to reveal any such bacteria.

A call for the celebration of the Birthday of Lafayette September 6 has been issued from New York. Municipalities were asked to cooperate with patriotic societies in honoring the memory of the great Frenchman.

An agreement to settle the judgment of \$252,000 in the case of D. E. Loewe and company against Danbury, Conn., haters, members of the United Hatters of North America has been reached. The settlement was for approximately two-thirds of the amount of the judgment.

Emma Goldman and Alexander Berkman, anarchists, were ordered released from prison on \$25,000 bail each by United States Supreme Court Justice Brandeis when he granted a writ of error in their cases in Washington.

Governor Harrington of Maryland issued a proclamation requiring unemployed able-bodied men between the ages of 18 and 50 years, in the state, to register on or before August 20. The governor is determined those who do not fight shall work.

The government will withdraw all guards from Nebraska August 1, subject to reservations of the command of the central department, according to a letter received by Governor Neville from Secretary of War Baker.

The Texas potato crop, which has been marketed, brought prices ranging from \$2.25 to \$3 per bushel and averaging \$2.81 per bushel.

Nine Kansas counties and the city of Topeka will not have to furnish a single man for the first contingent of the new national army, according to the county draft quotas.

The Rev. William ("Billy") Sunday was arrested for exceeding the speed limit in his automobile at Portland, Ore. Sunday was on his way from his ranch at Hood River to Portland when arrested. The driver was fined \$5, which was paid by the evangelist.

Washington Notes.

President Wilson pardoned the sixteen suffragists who were serving a sixty-day sentence in the workhouse at Occoquan, Va., for picketing in front of the White House.

According to a bulletin issued by the federal farm loan board 5 per cent loans to farmers of the United States are being approved by the board at the rate of over half a million per day.

The German political crisis centers principally on the question of peace and internal reform, according to a review of State department advices issued by the committee on public information.

Secretary Daniels asked congress for a deficiency appropriation of \$100,000 mainly for additional destroyers and submarine chasers and to speed up work on the building program.

Reports that the activities of the Industrial Workers of the World in the west recently had been financed by German gold have failed of substantiation after an exhaustive investigation by agents of the Department of Justice.

Representatives of fifteen farmers' organizations conferred with members of the food administration and adopted resolutions protesting against the plan of senate leaders to fix a price of \$1.75 a bushel for wheat in the food control bill.

W. J. Shortbill of York, Neb., secretary of the National Council of Farmers' Co-operative associations, representing about 400,000 grain farmers, sent to every senator a letter demanding the prompt passage of the food control bill.

Sixteen woman suffragists, arrested while participating in the woman's party Basile Day demonstration in Washington in front of the White House, were sentenced in police court to serve sixty days in the District of Columbia workhouse for obstructing the sidewalks.

European War News.

There is persistent reports in Buenos Aires that a rupture between Argentina and Germany is imminent.

Following clashes between government forces and Maximillists at Petrograd the list of casualties, so far as is ascertained, comprises six persons killed and 238 wounded.

The British dreadnought Vanguard has been blown up by an internal explosion with the loss of approximately 700 lives. The disaster occurred while the warship was at anchor. The Vanguard measured 12,250 tons and her complement before the war was 870 men.

Total German casualties, since the war began, according to London official figures are: Killed or died of wounds, 1,062,800; died of sickness, 72,960; prisoners and missing, 591,966; wounded, 2,825,581. The naval and colonial casualties are not included.

From July 1 to July 13, according to a Russian official report, 36,042 officers and men of the Teutonic armies have been made prisoner by General Brusiloff's forces and 93 heavy and light guns, 28 trench mortars, 403 machine guns and 91 guns of other descriptions have been taken.

Germany will not make another peace offer; the peace she desires to conclude is that of a victor and it is the allies who must hereafter make overtures to end the war. This was the challenge flung to the world by Chancellor George Michaelis, new premier of Germany, in his maiden speech to the reichstag.

Important changes have taken place in the British cabinet. Andrew Bonar Law, chancellor of the exchequer, has retired and is replaced by Sir Edward Carson. Sir Eric Geddes has assumed the position of first lord of the admiralty, succeeding Sir Carson. Winston Spencer Churchill has assumed the post of minister of munitions.

It is officially reported Kaiser Wilhelm has accepted the resignation of his imperial chancellor, Theobald von Bethmann-Hollweg, and has appointed Dr. George Michaelis, under secretary of finance for Prussia, and a privy counselor, in his place.

Fourteen British ships of over 1,600 tons were sunk by submarine or mine during the week ending July 14, according to the official report. Four British vessels under 1,600 tons were sunk and eight fishing vessels.

With an army of 100,000 men ready for active service, Greece has joined the allied nations in the struggle for democracy. Greece is capable of organizing an army of nearly a half million and its entry into the war is expected to be a decided help to the allies in the Balkans.

MINOR NOTES FROM ALL PARTS OF NEBRASKA

Twenty-seven pastors and heads of the nine branches of the Lutheran church of America officially purged the church of the Nebraska defense council's charges of disloyalty at a meeting held at Omaha, when resolutions were adopted affirming the loyalty of the church in America. The ministers represented the Lutherans of Nebraska directly and those of the entire country indirectly.

Judge Brown, at a hearing in Friend, held the mothers' pension law passed by the 1915 legislature to be unconstitutional, upon a demurrer filed by Charles F. Barth, county attorney. On account of the importance of the decision, an appeal will be taken to the supreme court.

A. E. Cole and A. V. Grammer are in the custody of authorities at Lincoln charged with the murder of Mrs. Lulu Vogt, aged lady, whose body was found near St. Paul, July 5. Cole, it is alleged, has confessed to the crime, declaring that Grammer promised to pay him \$500 for the murder.

Hamilton county enjoys the distinction of furnishing more men voluntarily to Uncle Sam's fighting forces than it was required to furnish under the selective draft law. The county's quota was fixed by the war department at 145 and 151 men had volunteered before the drawing.

Ten thousand members of the Fraternal Order of Eagles, who are now in service, or will go into service after the draft, will each be presented with a \$1,000 life insurance policy by the order. Eagle orders in Nebraska are waging a campaign to increase the military fund of the order.

Representatives of the Nebraska district of the United Danish Evangelical Lutheran church at a meeting in Blair passed resolution declaring the charges of the state council of defense against the Lutheran church to be "entirely unwarranted and unjust."

June, the 13-month-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Samuel Parker, of Omaha, fell fifty feet from the window of her parents' apartment, but, according to physicians, received no apparent injuries, which is considered a miracle.

It is authoritatively stated that wheat in Chase county is the best for seed purposes in the state. Farmers in the county are now in the midst of harvesting and the yield is expected to be large.

Objection to holding a Chautauqua at Fremont during the tractor demonstration next month has been raised by the president of the National Power Farming Demonstration association. An appropriation of \$12,500 will be made to the city of Scottsbluff for a public library building, according to information received by Beach Coleman, of that city, from the Carnegie corporation.

Mrs. Herman Veith of Fremont was instantly killed when she ran in front of a runaway team hitched to a heavy binder, the machine passing completely over her body.

A party of twenty-five Russians went west from Omaha, enroute to Russia, where the younger men will enter the war to fight against the Germans.

A community drying plant, to be operated under the Dodge county branch of the Nebraska Defense league, has been put in operation at Fremont.

Alva Davies, one of the best known farmers in Polk county, and his 9-year-old son, were drowned in Platte river near Havens, 18 miles from Osceola.

Butterfield company of Norfolk marketed two loads of cattle at the South Omaha market the other day that brought \$13.85 per hundred pounds, a record price.

Mmanuel Ramirez, Mexican, was instantly killed during a tornado which visited North Platte. Roofs of buildings were torn off, huge trees uprooted, windows and electric signs of business houses broken and frame buildings in various parts of town blown down. The storm was the most destructive in the section for many years.

Tom Broz, purchased a lot in Howells, recently, paying for it \$330 in cash. The money so spent had been earned by the boy by doing odd jobs ever since he was ten years of age.

Methodists of Lexington took their basket dinners last Sunday and drove by auto to a large grove, six miles out in the country, where church and Sunday school was held in the open, followed by a picnic. The procession of autos to the grove was six miles long.

A new record price for a full load of cattle was paid on the South Omaha market for twenty-five head shipped from Ord, by Harvey Parks and Charles Burdick. The cattle averaged 1,204 pounds and sold for \$13.75 per hundredweight.

The experiment of having the Omaha mail carriers complete all deliveries even if it took them more than eight hours a day did not prove a success, and the carriers are now back to their old eight-hour schedule.

Reports from all cities in Nebraska taking part in the Red Cross \$100,000,000 campaign, compiled by the Red Cross war council, show the following subscriptions to the war fund up to July 7: Alliance, \$8,359.33; Antelope, \$4,351.25; Beatrice, \$46,900.00; Bridgeport, \$18,012.20; Broken Bow, \$5,000; County of Buffalo, \$29,172.45; Cambridge, \$2,100.00; Central City, \$4,900.00; Chadron, \$5,433.66; Crawford, \$2,633.15; Creighton, \$3,494.67; Fremont, \$27,000.00; Grand Island, \$30,775.00; Hastings, \$15,992.00; Hllah, \$21,000.00; Imperial, \$964.00; Kearney, \$25,000.00; Lincoln, \$90,000.00; Madison, \$1,334.00; McCook, \$18,463; Nebraska City, \$28,000; Neligh, \$20,000; Norfolk, \$15,000; North Platte, \$7,000; Omaha, \$251,252.49; Plattsmouth, \$15,000; Tekamah, \$12,000; Stanton, \$900.00; Scottsbluff, \$39,000; Theftford, \$90.00; York, \$1,000.00. The grand total amounts to \$749,631.20.

Application of land owners and water users under the 16 Tristate canal in Scotts Bluff and Morrill counties to make the ditch a government project with the government as trustee was granted by Secretary of the Interior Lane. The government reclamation department hereafter will manage the canal, which irrigates about 60,000 acres, 50,000 acres of which is now under cultivation. The plan reduces interest charges from 6 to 4 per cent, and provides that the government pay off the balance of the bonds.

Personal property and real estate valuations in Douglas county were increased \$10,723,653 by County Assessor Fitzgerald and the board of equalization this year, according to official figures. There are 9,122 automobiles in Douglas county, valued at \$3,330,000, and 9,828 horses, valued at \$630,570, according to the assessor's returns.

A young farmer of western Iowa was on the South Omaha market recently with five fatted brood sows, which brought a total of \$440. These sows had all raised a brood of pigs this spring. It was only a few years ago that a farmer thought he was getting a big price if he sold a fatted steer for \$88, the amount each sow brought.

The Union Pacific and other western roads in Nebraska contemplate curtailing their passenger trains where possible to save fuel and cut down overhead expense, according to General Manager Jeffers of the Union Pacific, who just returned to Omaha from a meeting of western railroad heads in Chicago.

Hastingsites by the hundreds attended a public dance given on the new asphalt paving in the business section of the city, proceeds from which were donated to the Red Cross. Owing to the shortage of farm help in Gage county a number of women have gone to work in the harvest fields.

Rabbits, which have proved a valuable source of food in Europe during the present war, may well be raised more extensively in America by way of reducing the drain on the ordinary meat supply, according to biologists of the United States department of agriculture.

Representative Sloan has made it possible for the Nebraska State Historical society to borrow from the authorities at Washington, a large oil painting of the first homestead in the United States. It was in Gage county and Daniel Freeman was the homesteader. The house was built of logs.

The federal land bank at Omaha received a check for \$5,000 from William J. Bryan for purchase of \$5,000 worth of land bank bonds.

Friend has contributed \$5,523 to the Red Cross fund, which is \$4.50 for every man, woman and child in the town.

Seward county has organized a company of home guards. Only men who are not subject to draft are enlisted in the home guard.

Indications at present are that the second national swine show, which will be held in Omaha October 3 to 10, will exceed the first show both in number of animals shown and general high quality. An agricultural students' judging contest will be one of the features of the show, and the "Evolution of the Hog" will be another.

About 1,500 people attended a patriotic demonstration given at Cortland in honor of thirteen young men of that vicinity who recently enlisted in Company F of the Fifth regiment.

All efforts to dispose of \$40,000 of school bonds of the Aurora district having failed, the board of education has called a special election to vote on 5 per cent bonds. It is said the governments offer of Liberty loan bonds caused the 4 per cent school project to fail.

B. E. Ridgely, a stock raiser at Pickett, sold forty-one head of Poland China hogs, which netted him \$2,261.54. Six of the hogs weighed 700 pounds each and sold for \$613.20, over \$100 each.

The government aid road from Fremont to Yankton got through Laurel by way of West Point, Wayne and from there to Coleridge, Hartington and Fordyce, making about fifty miles in Cedar county.

C. E. Miller of Omaha has made reservations through the Fremont Commercial club for three business men of Havana, Cuba, who will attend the Fremont tractor meet next month.

The Griswold seed farm, near Lincoln, was sold recently for \$36,000 at the rate of \$225 per acre.

Tons of Gold Dollars.

The statement that there has just been counted in New York, at the United States assay office, the enormous sum of \$765,000,000 in gold may be visualized somewhat when this is translated into ounces, pounds and tons, writes Girard in the Philadelphia Ledger.

While it has been asserted that this sum probably is the largest amount of gold coin and bullion ever accumulated in one place, it is well to remember that only so recently as a year ago there was said to be \$600,000,000 in gold and bullion in the Russian State bank.
