Apple Graham Cracker Cake

Contributed by Mrs. Alberta J. Cooke

Cream together until smooth:

3 tablespoons butter

½ Cup sugar

Add and beat in thoroughly:

2 egg yolks

Combine and blend:

2 cups graham cracker crumbs, finely crushed

2½ teaspoons baking powder

¼ teaspoon salt

Add the crumb mixture to the creamed ingredients alternately with:

½ cup milk

1 teaspoon vanilla

Mix thoroughly. Fold in lightly at the last:

2 stiffly beaten egg whites

Pour half of the mixture into a well-oiled glass pie plate, cover with:

1 cup sliced, unpeeled apples
Pour the remainder of the mixture over the apples and arrange artistically on top of it:

1 cup sliced unpeeled apples

Scatter over apples:

2 tablespoons melted butter

3 teaspoons sugar mixed with ¼ teaspoon cinnamon

Bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees F.) for about 45 minutes or until apples are tender. Serve warm, topped with whipped cream, to six or eight.

Seafood Sauce

4 tbs. butter

1 tbs. green peppers, chopped

1 cup sliced mushrooms

2 tbs. onion, chopped

4 tbs. flour

2 cups milk

½ tsp salt

⅛ tsp. pepper

When well blended add milk slowly stirring constantly until mixture thickens. Add flaked fish and chopped parsley pour into center of ring mold and serve piping hot.

Serves 6 to 8 persons.

This sauce is especially meant to be used with the Macaroni Luncheon Ring in last week's issue, but may be used with any sea food.

Take My Word for It

Several ministers have requested recently that I try again to clear up the popular confusion as to the proper use of the title Reverend. Says one, "I object heartily to being called "Reverend" or being addressed as "Reverend Blank."

Let us start at the beginning with this simple fact: Reverend is not an official title like Doctor, Major, Governor. It is simply an adjective of respect like "The Honorable" before the names of members of Congress, mayors of cities, etc. Moreover, in good usage, there is no such thing as a "Reverend," and no theological or other school awards the degree or title of "Reverend."

Now then, how should Reverend be used in writing to or of, and in speaking to or of a minister?

1. Either of these forms is correct in writing to a clergyman:

The Reverend John Jones.

Mr. (or Dr.) John Jones." (Note;

2. These salutations are correct: Dear Sir; Dear Mr. (or Dr.) Jones. (Never "Dear Reverend; Dear Rev. Jones.")

3. In speaking to a clergyman say: Mr. Jones; or, if he holds the degree of Doctor of Divinity, or any other degree of doctor: Dr. Jones. (Never: "Reverend," or "Reverenced Jones.")

4. In speaking of a clergyman, say, "Our pastor, Mr. Jones; our minister, Dr. Jones; the Reverend Mr. (or Dr.) John Jones." (note Use of Reverend with the surname alone, as "Reverend Jones," is to be avoided at all times in both speaking and writing.)

Use of "Reverend" parallels exactly the use of "Honorable." No one would think of addressing, say, a congressman as "Honorable" or "Honorable Jones."

Nor should any clergyman ever use "Reverend" in referring to himself in speech or writing. His stationary should be headed:

John J. Jones

Pastor, First Blank Church

Or, if he is a Doctor of Divinity:

John J. Jones, D. D.

Pastor, First Blank Church

He should sign his letters: John J. Jones; or John J. Jones, D. D. (Never: "Pastor John J. Jones, Rev. John J. Jones," or "Dr. John J. Jones.")
