Since I began to ask God's blessing on my studies, I have done more in one week than I have done in a whole year before. Payson.

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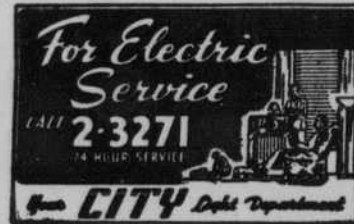
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
