Bloomington, Ind .- (ANP) Bill Garrett, the "Mr. Basketball of 1947" for the annual all-star game between Indiana and Kentucky High School seniors, enrolled as a freshman at the fall opening of Indiana University.

Garrett, who was captain of the Rushville High School team which won the 1947 basketball chambionship, had originally planned to enter the University of California, but was persuaded by Nate Kauffman, Shelbyville; Herman Wells, president of Indiana University, and "Bo" Mc-Millin, the university's football coach, to change his mind.
