1 pkg. strawberry gelatin

1 cup boiling water

1 cup diced celery

cup thick cranberry sauce

Dissolve gelatin in boiling water. Stir lemon juice Chill until partially set. old in celery, pineapple and cranberry uce. Pour into 1½ qt. ring mold. Chill. smold on lettuce. Spoon creamy fruit easing in center. Yield: Six esrvings.

Creamy Fruit Dressing

cup sugar
tablespoons flour
eggs, beaten
tablespoons cil
Juice of 1 lemon
Juice of 1 orange
tup pinearple juice
tup heavy cream, whipped

Mix sugar, flour and eggs together in top of double boiler, Blend in oil and ulces. Cook over gently boiling water intil thickened, 10 minutes, stirring con-itantly. Cool. Fold cooled mixture into whipped cream. Yield: 3 cups dressing.



Chili

lb. coarsely ground or chopped

Lard or drippings for browning

cup chopped onion tbsp. minced garlic tbsp. chili powder tbsp. paprika cup tomatoes

cups cooked red beans

Cook meat and onions in lard or drippings until meat is brown but not hard, Add garlic, chili powder, paprika and tomatoes. Cover and cook slowly for 1 hour. Add cooked beans and cook long enough for them to heat thoroughly. Serve on boiled rice, if desired, 6 servings.


