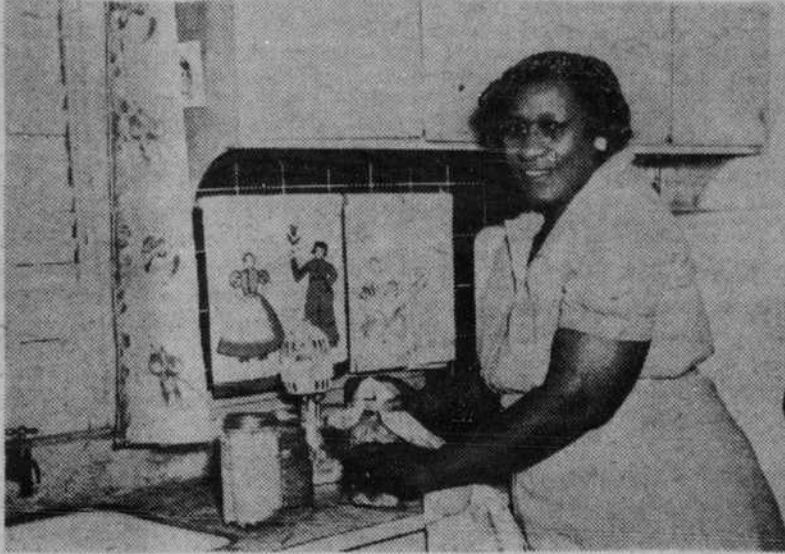

DATE CAKE.

1 pkg. dates cut up 1 egg well beaten
1 cup boiling water 1/2 cup milk
(mix and allow to 1/2 tsp. salt
cool) 2 cups flour
1 tsp. soda 1 tsp. baking powder
1 cup sugar 1 tsp. vanilla
1/2 cup shortening 1/2 cup nut meats
Cream the shortening and sugar, add
beaten egg. Then add dry ingredients, al-
ternately with milk. Add date mixture and
nuts. Bake 30 minutes in 350 degree F
oven.

PEANUT BRITTLE.

Combine in saucepan:
1 cup sugar
1/2 cup light corn syrup
1/2 cup water
Stir until sugar is dissolved. Cook rapidly
until small amount in cold water forms a
very hard ball (268 degrees F.). Add:
2 cups whole peanuts
1 1/2 teaspoons butter
Continue cooking slowly until peanuts are
brown and a small amount of syrup in cold
water forms a hard crack (310 degrees

1 tablespoon sugar
3/4 teaspoon soda
Sprinkle these pancakes with sugar and
stack them as you bake and serve the
whole family at one time after all the
cakes are baked.
Serve with syrup, honey or with cream
and sugar.
