Macaroni Loaf

½ cup elbow macaroni, 1 cup scalded milk, 1 cup soft bread crumbs, 1 tablespoon butter, 1 tablespoon chopped onion, 1 tablespoon chopped green pepper, 1 tablespoon minced parsley, 2 eggs, 1 teaspoon salt, ½ cup American cheese, grated, butter.

Cook macaroni until tender and rinse in cold water. Saute onion, pepper and parsley in butter until soft. Beat yolks and whites of eggs separately. Mix vegetables, egg yolks and salt with macaroni. Stir in whites of eggs. Put a layer of macaroni in well oiled or buttered baking dish; cover with a layer of vegetables, add a layer of cheese mixed with bread crumbs, and alternate layers, with cheese and bread crumbs on top. Pour milk over and dot with butter, bake at 350 degrees F. for 40 minutes.

Tuna Pie

1¼ cups diced potatoes, ¼ cup diced celery, 1 tablespoon chopped onion, ¼ cup canned peas, 1 pimiento cut in strips, 1 7-ounce can (1 cup) flaked tuna, ¼ teaspoon salt, ¼ teaspoon pepper, ½ cup vegetable liquor, 1 tablespoon flour, 1 recipe cheese swirls.

Cook potatoes, celery, and onion in small amount of salted water until tender. Drain. Combine vegetables and tuna. Pour into greased 1-quart casserole. Add seasonings. Gradually add vegetable liquor to flour; blend. Pour

over tuna and vegetables. Arrange cheese swirls on top. Bake in moderately hot oven (400 degrees) 20 minutes. Serves 4 to 5.

Cheese Swirls

Sift 1 cup flour with ¼ teaspoon salt and 2 teaspoons baking powder; cut in 1½ to 2 tablespoons shortening. Add ½ cup milk; mix just until flour is moistened. Turn onto lightly floured surface; knead ½ minute. Roll ¼ inch thick. Sprinkle with ¼ cup grated American cheese. Roll as jelly roll. Cut ½-inch slices. Makes 8 or 9 biscuits.

Crusty Cheese Loaf

Cut crusts from top and sides of unsliced loaf. Slice to, but not through, bottom crust. Blend ½ cup butter or fortified margarine with ½ pound sharp, spreading cheese. Spread slices, top and sides. Tie with string. Bake in hot oven (400 degrees) 20 minutes, until cheese is melty and bread crusty.

Household Hints

1. Uncovered food in the refrigerator will speed up the formation of ice on the freezing unit.
2. Small rag rugs will not curl under foot if you dip the ends in weak starch after they are washed.
