Savory Rice Casserole

Rice, cooked, 2 cups
Cheese, process American, cubed, 1 cup
Eggs, beaten, 2
Tomatoes, fresh or canned, 1 cup
Salt, 1 teaspoon
Pepper, 1/4 teaspoon
Worcestershire sauce, 1/2 teaspoon

Combine all ingredients and place in heatproof bowl or pan that will fit into your pressure pan. Tie waxed paper over bowl. Place on rack with 2 cups water in pan. Cook at 15 pounds pressure for 20 minutes.

1/2 cup Spry 2 eggs
2 ounces chocolate 1 cup sugar
1/2 cup sifted flour 1 teaspoon vanilla
1/2 teaspoon baking powder 1 cup nuts, cut coarse
1/4 teaspoon salt

WITH APPETIZER—crunchable bites of savory goodness

Cheese Bites
Butter or fortified margarine, 2 tablespoons
Wheat cereal biscuits (bite size), 1 cup
Salt, 1/4 teaspoon
American process cheese, grated, 1/2 cup

Melt butter or margarine in skillet over low heat. Add cereal; sprinkle with salt and stir gently; then sprinkle with cheese and continue to stir over low heat until cheese melts. Cool and store in a covered jar for nibblers or serve warm at once. Makes enough for 4 servings.

Banana or Cranberry Whip
Beat 2 egg whites with 1/8 teaspoon salt until stiff but not dry; gradually beat in 2 tablespoons sugar, then 1/2 cup mashed bananas, 1 cup jellied cranberry sauce and 2 teaspoons lemon juice. Continue beating till very fluffy. Chill thoroughly. Serve on sponge cake slices. Makes 4 servings.

Brownies

Melt Spry and chocolate together over not water. Cool. Sift flour with baking powder and salt. Beat eggs until light, add sugar, then chocolate mixture, and blend.* Add flour, vanilla, and nuts, and mix well. Bake in 8x8-inch Sprycoated pan in moderate oven (350° F.) 30 to 35 minutes. Cool and cut in squares. Makes 16.

*If you like Brownies extra soft and chewy, add 2 tablespoons of corn sirup to this mixture.
