It was very nice of some of you to remember me during my illness last week. 'Bye now, Dotty.

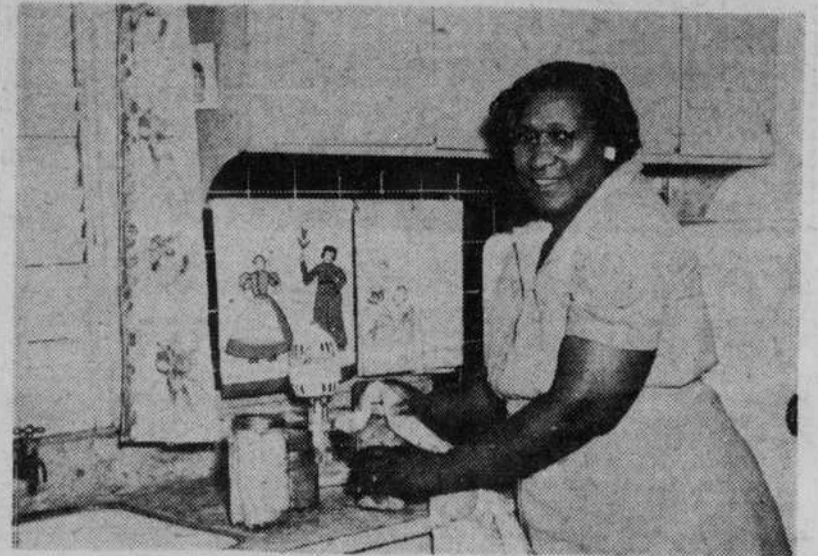

Quick Rolls

Beat one egg and add 3/4 cup of milk that has been scalded and cooled. Crumble and add one cake of yeast and stir until it becomes smooth. Add 2 1/2 to 3 cups of good biscuit mix. Stir until a soft dough. Make into rolls and let rise until double in bulk. Bake in 375 degree oven for about 25 minutes. Can be kept in refrigerator and used as wanted.

Parnip Fritters

Two cups boiled parnips (drain and mash) Add 2 tbs. melted butter. 1 tsp. salt. 1 egg unbeaten. Mix thoroughly and make into cakes about 1/2 inch thick and fry in deep fat until golden brown.

Epicurean Halibut

1 can condensed tomato soup 1/2 pound grated cheddar cheese 1 pound cooked halibut salt and pepper toast triangles Heat soup; add cheese, heat, stirring occasionally until cheese is melted. Flake halibut in large pieces, add to tomato mixture, season with salt and pepper and serve on toast. Serves 4.

Russian Tea

1/2 cup sugar 1/2 cup water 1/2 teaspoon powdered cloves 1 2" stick cinnamon 1 teaspoon grated lemon rind 1 teaspoon grated orange rind 1/2 cup orange juice 2 tablespoons lemon juice 1/2 cup pineapple juice 3 cups boiling water 1/2 cup tea leaves Combine first six ingredients.

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Boil 10 minutes. Remove cinnamon; add juices; keep hot. Pour boiling water over tea. Steep 10 minutes. Strain. Combine mixtures. Serve in tea or punch cups. Makes 6 to 8 servings.

Cheese Scrambled Eggs

2 tablespoons fortified margarine 6 eggs beaten 1/2 teaspoon salt 1/2 teaspoon pepper 1/2 cup milk 1 1/2 3-oz. packages cream cheese Melt margarine in double boiler. Tip it back and forth to cover sides. Combine eggs with salt, pepper, milk. Cook in double boiler, over boiling water, until eggs just begin to set on bottom and sides. Then occasionally scrape bottom and sides gently with spoon, so liquid portion flows to bottom. Repeat until eggs are nearly set. Fold in cheese cut in small pieces. Serve at once on toast. Makes 4 servings.

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
