Discuss Results of New Drug Tests

If the new British drug, antrycide, being experimented with in Africa proves successful, the scourge of sleeping sickness will be conquered and natives and animals will have a freer life. Now that the Lent season is here and we are wondering what we could serve that would be a little different try this casserole dish. I believe your family will like them. Please call sometime and let me know how you like them.

Macaroni Escaloped with Asparagus

- 1 lb. macaroni
- 1 bunch asparagus
- 1/4 cup butter
- 2 tbsps. flour
- 1 cup liquid
- 1 cup top milk
- 1 tsp. salt
- Few grains pepper
- 1/2 cup bread crumbs
- 1/2 cup grated cheese
- 8 slices bacon

Cook macaroni in boiling water one-half hour; drain. Wash and trim asparagus. Cook in boiling water until tender; drain reserving one cup of liquid. Make white sauce of butter, flour, liquid, milk, and seasonings.

Cut macaroni and asparagus in small pieces and place in alternate layers in greased casserole, pouring white sauce over each layer. Cover with crumbs and cheese mixed together. Bake in 350° F.

oven 30 minutes. Garnish with strips of bacon.

Rainbow Fruit Salad.

- 1 cup pineapple
- 1 cup green grapes
- 1 cup orange sections
- 1 banana
- 1/2 lb. marshmallows
- 1 cup whipping cream
- 1 cup grapefruit sections
- 1 cup salad dressing
- Lettuce or endive

This salad can be made many ways. Here's one method. Cut the slices of pineapple into quarters. Cut grapes in half and remove seeds. Peel and slice banana. Prepare orange and grapefruit sections. Cut marshmallows into fourths. Combine fruits in a mixing bowl and place in refrigerator to chill, not freeze. Whip cream and add half of it to the salad dressing you are going to use.

Arrange salad on crisp lettuce leaves or endive. Add salad dressing; top with whipped cream.

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
