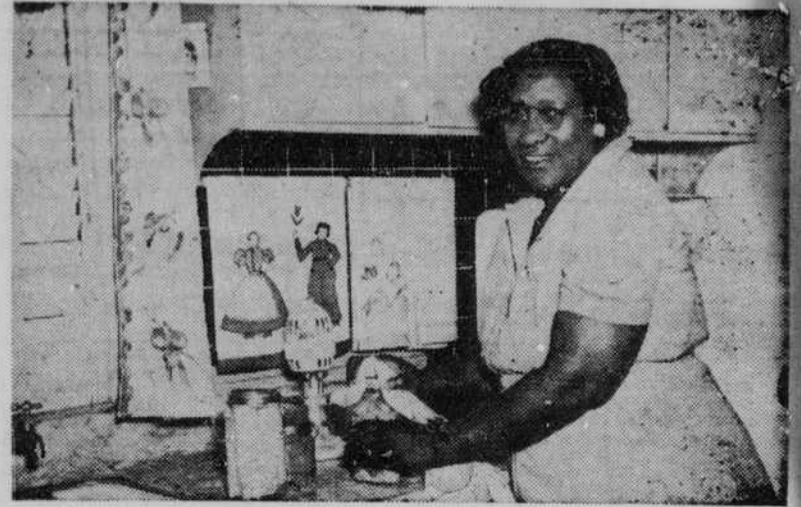
It seems like the Finley sisters are real gone in their musical talent, Vonna won first prize on the program at C. T. and was to appear there Saturday night, March 19.

SHORT CUT. "When I'm in a hurry to bake potatoes I remove a one-inch cylinder from the potatoes and then place them, with the hole down, on the baking shelf. They bake in half the time and I serve them with butter in the holes."

CORN CHOWDER WITH TOMATO JUICE

- 1/2 cup diced onion
- 1 No. 2 can corn (cream style)
- 2 cups raw potatoes, diced
- 2 cups cold water
- 1 No. 2 can tomato juice
- 2 tablespoons flour
- 1/2 cup evaporated milk
- 1/2 cup water
- 1 1/2 teaspoons salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper

Brown onion in fat until tender. Add corn, potatoes and water. Cover and simmer over

low heat for about 25 minutes or until potatoes are tender. Watch and be sure potatoes don't stick to bottom. Add tomato juice. Dilute the evaporated milk with water. Blend flour and diluted milk and combine with vegetables. Add seasonings. Heat, top with toasted bread crumbs, and serve six.

TO MEND. "Powdered alum melted in an old spoon and rubbed to the broken edges of china or glass will unite them. Press together and let dry. They will not come apart even in hot dish water."

FOR BURNS. "Vanilla poured on a cloth and laid over the burned spot will relieve the pain."
