A highly controversial figure in Nebraska territorial politics was Mark W. Izard, governor of the territory during the years 1855-57.

Governor Izard was born in Kentucky and reared in Alabama. At the age of 23 he married the daughter of George Shackelford, a the capital from Omaha. prominent resident of Charlestown, South Carolina, and moved on the edge of the wilderness. He acquired considerable property, in Arkansas politics, serving both he died in August, 1866. as speaker of the house and president of the Senate in the Arkansas legislature.

He was appointed United States marshal for Nebraska territory in October, 1854, and about two months later won appointment as the second governor of Nebraska from a long list of applicants. The new governor's oath was administered in Washington, and territorial government from Sec-

Governor Izard encountered serious opposition from the very makers of the state, because it is beginning. In the first place, he was looked upon as a "carpetbagger" by many disappointed applicants for his job-including Cuming-who had lived in the second place, he was accused of forming an alliance with Omaha interests to the detriment of the

rest of the territory.

Governor Izard's capacity for the job of chief executive frequently was called into question to Mount Vernon, Arkansas, then by his contemporaries, and the territorial press often referred to him contemptuously as "Gov-ernor Lizard." Weary of this sort including a rather large number of criticism, he resigned in 1857 of slaves, and rose to prominence and returned to Arkansas, where
