(1) "It is an implementation of the moral and natural law because it proclaims that discrimination because of race, color, creed or national origin is detrimental to the orderly processes of our society.

(2) It becomes more difficult to sell our idea of democracy on an international level if we continue to permit discrimination because of race, religion or ancestry to be a determining factor in job placement opportunities.

(3) Second class citizenship is foreign to our ideals and policies as stated in our constitution.

(4) Discrimination in employment causes waste of our human resources in our national economics because it prevents the full scheduled Tuesday, June 14, at and effective use of talents, skills and abilities."


