Ham and Egg Shortcake

Biscuit dough for 12 biscuits

One can cream of mushroom soup

- 1/2 cup milk
- 1/4 cup diced cooked ham
- 1/2 diced pimiento (optional)
- 3 hard-cooked eggs

Heat oven to 450° F (hot). Roll biscuit dough; cut with 2-inch cutter. Place on baking sheet; bake about 15 minutes or until done. Put soup in saucepan; stir until smooth. Add milk slowly, stirring constantly; heat. Quarter the eggs; add ham, eggs, pimiento. Simmer a few minutes.

Split biscuits and pour about 2/3 of creamed ham and eggs over bottom layer. Replace tops and pour on remainder. Make six servings.

Double Strawberry Shortcake (Serves 8)

- 1 pie crust (your regular recipe)
- 2 pints strawberry ice cream (brick style)
- 1 cup whipped cream
- 4 tbsp. granulated sugar, 1/4 tsp. vanilla.
- 2 cups sliced, sweetened strawberries.

1. Prepare pie crust as usual and roll out very thin.

2. Cut with pastry wheel into 16 squares or oblongs, about 1/4 inch larger than ice cream slices.

3. Prick thoroughly tines of fork and bake in a hot oven (450° F) about 10 minutes. Cool.

4. Beat cream until it begins to thicken. Add sugar gradually. Continue beating so cream holds shape. Add vanilla.

5. Cut ice cream into 1 inch

slices and place each slice between two squares of pastry.

6. Top with strawberries and whipped cream.

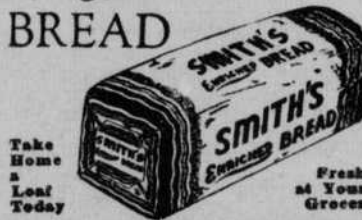
