Dr. Charles Drew, Blood Bank Maker, Visits Europe

FRANKFURT, Germany. (ANP). Dr. Charles R. Drew, noted physician, authority on hematology and pioneer in the field of blood therapy, recently arrived here with a group of leading civilian medical specialists to serve as a consultant to the medical corps of the European occupation command on problems of blood transfusion and storage.

His tour is under the auspices of the civilian consultant program of the Surgeon General's office of the army, which periodically sends representative groups of civilian physicians to medical installations in overseas commands.

Dr. Drew, on his visit, conferred chiefly with personnel of the laboratory service at the 97th General hospital. A resident of Washington, D. C., his experimentation in blood preservation and development of techniques for the preparation of blood plasma transfusions are now used universally. He launched the "Blood For Britain" project in Presbyterian hospital, New York.
